James Roosevelt Bayley, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Baltimore, and, next to Orestes A. He was of an old New York family, his father and gandfather having both been distinguished medical practitioners in this city. Educated originally for the ministry in the Protestant Episcopal Church, he was for a time (1840-41) rector in Harlem. Here his theological opinions began to change, and, resigning his position, he went to Rome, where he was, in 1842, received into the Roman Catholic Church. He attended the St. Sulpice Seminary, Paris, and prepared there for holy orders. In 1843 he was ordained priest at New York by Arobishop Hughes. After a brief service as pastor, he became the private secretary of the archibishop. In 1853 he was consecrated the first bishop of the diocese of Newark. 
