The York County Sunday School Executive met at Gibson to plan the work for the coming year. The county was divided into the following districts: No. 1—Fredericton, Kingsclear, New Marysland. No. 2—Stanley, St. Marys. No. 3—Dundas, Bridgetown. No. 4—Southampton, Canterbury. No. 5—Adam, Mainer, Sutton. No. 6—Queensbury, Dumfries, Prince William. Institutes are to be held in each district when organization will be completed and officers elected. The first institute is to be in No. 2 district at Mouth of Kewich, October 13th, Wednesday afternoon and evening. The following programme is being arranged: School organization and equipment by Rev. D. J. Simpson. Lesson for Oct. 14th taught, and how to review a school. Modern methods in primary, by Mrs. Simpson. Normal work—Rev. Mr. Fields. Special work—exercises, rally day. Rev. Mr. Lucas. Temperance day—Rev. Dr. Cook. Decision day—Rev. Mr. Simpson. The second institute will be held at Kingsclear, Oct. 17th, and the speakers will be largely from No. 1 district.

## SYNOUD TO MEET NEXT TUESDAY

Important Question of Selecting a Coadjutor Bishop Large Attendance of Clergymen and Laymen Expected.

From all indications there will be a very large assemblage of clergymen and laymen in this city on Tuesday next, when the adjourned meeting of the synod will be held, to decide on the selection of a coadjutor bishop for this diocese. The meeting will be opened in the church hall at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday afternoon, the Ven. Archbishop Neales acting as chairman of the meeting. Nearly all the clergymen throughout the diocese have signified their intention of attending, only two or three notices being received from those unable to attend. There is also likely to be a much larger representation of the laymen throughout the diocese than at the former regular meeting of the synod. A clergyman stated yesterday that he would not be at all surprised if the meeting lasted three or four days. Several of the delegates will arrive on Monday, and the others on Tuesday morning.

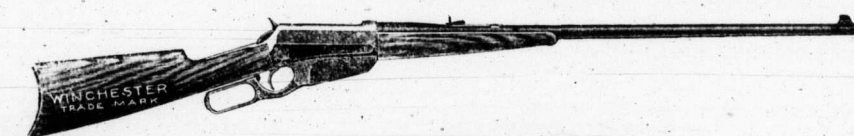
