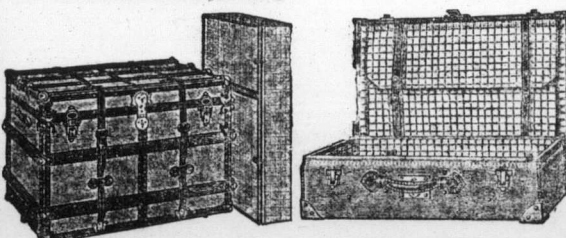

## GERMAN BANKER IS OPTIMISTIC

Sees Little to Worry About in  
the Present Financial  
Situation.

Montreal, Aug. 19.—"I have been travelling through Canada for six weeks, visiting all the principal cities in the West right up to Alaska, and although I find something in the nature of a spirit of depression troubling the real estate men, Canadian conditions are pretty sound, and with the harvesting in of the harvest, you will find a substantial, general all round improvement," said M. L. Zuckermund, a director of the German banking house of Schilling, Trier & Co. of Berlin, who arrived at the Ritz-Carlton yesterday with his son, M. Walter Zuckermund, who for the first time makes acquaintance with the Dominion.

The German financial reports that already there are employed in British Columbia vast sums of German capital, and he predicts that when European finance shall have come in to another waters following upon the settlement of the Balkan blase, the German market will flow over here in considerable streams, despite the fact that industrial activity at home absorbs heavy sums of gold. M. Zuckermund's first was the first to introduce Canadian Pacific stocks to the investors in the Fatherland, and as many of them bought as low down as 40 and 45, the huge profits reaped found great favor with their clients. Not only so, but the German visitor prophesies with a great deal of assurance that as easier conditions prevail those stocks will again be heavily bought in Berlin.

M. Zuckermund has kept open eye and ear through all his travels, and noted that since by and by the growth of the speculator, who seeks to reap where he has not sown there is tremendous industrial and commercial activity on every hand, creating rather than sowing wealth. Some of the smaller western municipalities had had to slow down owing to the financial stringency, but there had been little difficulty in the larger cities, some of which, even in these last days had successfully marketed their bonds.

With the German's eye for analysis, M. Zuckermund had carefully noted and he now emphasized the fact that the depression in real estate circles was a thing apart, and in fact no connection or any sort of relation to the general trade and prosperity of the Dominion. Of this he is quite certain, and upon it he builds his belief upon the triumphant emergence of Canada from such financial stringency as she had experienced. Germans, he says, everywhere, keep a keen eye upon the movements in Canada. He was convinced that the development of this country would go on and the realization of the crops would largely solve the money difficulties and produce the wonderful spirit of optimism so essential to the progress of new countries.

"Yes," said M. Zuckermund, "I am quite satisfied with the situation in the west. I visited Toronto, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Edmonton, Calgary, Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert, and saw nothing of German capital either, though not immediately, for home conditions following the war and preparations for war, have yet to return to normal shape. One thing of vital importance to Canada and all other borrowing and developing countries is this, that the European stock exchanges are all in exceptionally sound condition. The speculative elements have been eliminated all round, and when the time is ripe for a forward move, and good sound schemes of development come along, why the stock exchanges will be well prepared to deal with them.

"It is now fifteen years since I came to Canada, before and, of course, I see vast improvements everywhere. One thing has struck me very forcibly during my visit, and it is the exceptionally fine manner in which the railway and steamship traffic is handled, with the result that travelling has become a pleasure rather than the fearsome thing it was of other days.

## HUDSON BAY CO.'S \$2,000,000 STORE

First in Western Chain Opened  
at Calgary—A Gigantic  
Undertaking.

Calgary, Aug. 19.—With the arrival of the director, John Coles, special representative of Lord Strathcona, Governor of the Gentlemen Adventurers of England, all is in readiness for the opening of the \$2,000,000 department store of the Hudson's Bay Company here tomorrow. The affair will take on the color of an official function in which details of troops, the Lieut. Governor of Alberta, and possibly Saskatchewan, the mayor and aldermen of the city and other dignitaries will figure. The Governor is scheduled to arrive at the east entrance of the new building shortly before 1 o'clock. Brief addresses will be made by Director Coles on behalf of the Company, and the Lieut. Governor on behalf of Alberta. Massed bands will strike up the National Anthem, the flag of the Dominion, the store commission's ensign and the ancient flag of the company will be hoisted, a golden key will be turned in the massive doors of the east entrance, and the big store will be officially opened.

A reception and luncheon to the Lieut. Governor will follow the ceremony. These functions will be attended by the visiting officials, civic and military dignitaries of the company, including Director Coles, who will preside at the luncheon. Herbert E. Burbridge, stores commissioner; J. S. Thompson, land commissioner; Norman H. Baker, fur trade commissioner; Assistant Stores Commissioner May, other lesser dignitaries, and 300 invited guests from all over Western Canada.

During a portion of the day the entire Calgary street car system will be chartered by the company to convey Calgarians to the store which, for the time being, will be the centre of the system.

The Calgary establishment is the first of a chain of handsome department stores that the company is either building or contemplating constructing in Western Canada. The programme of building alone, involving the expenditure of something like \$10,000,000.

Consistent Burbridge stated today that the Calgary investment of the company, including building, stock and other property was in excess of \$3,000,000. The company will invest in Vancouver about \$1,000,000. The new store at Winnipeg, together with stock and other property, will make the company's investment in Winnipeg about \$1,000,000, which the Victoria store, which should be completed in March of next year, with stock and other property, will mean an investment of \$1,250,000. The new store at Winnipeg, together with stock and other property, will represent a sum in excess of \$7,000,000. The investment in Edmonton will be in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000. These cities are all embraced in the company's scheme of expenditure and some improvements will be made at later date at Fort William, Kenora, Yorkton, Qu'Appelle, Pincher Creek, Lethbridge, MacLeod, Nelson, Vernon, Kamloops and four points where it is now operating.

### 'FATAL COUNTESS' SUICIDE

Released From Jail Hanged Herself  
in Railway Carriage.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 19.—The Countess Tarnowska, who in 1910 was convicted in Venice of complicity in the murder of Count Kamarsky and sentenced to eight years' imprisonment, was found dead on a St. Petersburg-Kiev express train today. She had been hanged. The police are investigating in an effort to determine whether it is a case of suicide or murder. The countess was pardoned last year.

The Countess Marie Tarnowska, a beautiful Russian woman, was charged and found guilty of having persuaded a jealous youth, Nicholas Naumoff, to go to Venice from Vienna, and kill Count Kamarsky in order that she might obtain \$100,000 life insurance, the policy for which Kamarsky had taken out in her name. The Countess, it was said, was engaged to marry Kamarsky. It was charged at the trial that the Countess had a mania for making men love her and then turning them against one another. It was testified that she had repeatedly embraced Count Kamarsky in the presence of young Naumoff and had shown Naumoff forged love letters in order to arouse his jealousy. The Court also found Naumoff guilty, but mentally unbalanced and sentenced him to three years' imprisonment.

## ABJECT CONDITION OF LIBERAL PARTY

An Election This Year Would

the Opposition.

The party of pretence, trading on its reputed power of a bygone generation, would be outclassed on such a hopeless degree that in the arena there might be danger of a fatal knockout.
