During an Arctic exploration Lieut. Ray investigated the depth to which the ground was frozen. He says:—"I dug an earth shaft thirty-eight feet in depth for the purpose of testing the temperature and found, on calculation, that it was frozen to a depth of 300 ft. A bucketful of the stuff taken out of the shaft, when thawed out, separated into earth and water, about four inches of the latter standing on top. This proved that if the ground there were warmed sufficiently to be re-solved into its original parts it would be found to be quite incapable of supporting anything on its surface. It is really frozen slush."
