**MONKEY DUTY ON ALK**

Mr. Greenwood's regime in Manitoba is rapidly passing into history. Hugh John Macdonald will be Premier of the Province just as soon as the election is held.

A caucus of the Ontario members of the Conservative party was held on Thursday morning, when the question of what action should be taken with respect to the palpable frauds perpetrated by supporters of the Liberal party in the recent election at Brookville by-elections was thoroughly discussed. That there were extensive frauds in both elections, there is no doubt, and it is equally certain that there is no doubt that these frauds were perpetrated by an organized gang of crib heebers, who worked systematically and with great boldness in both ridings.
