Gardeners who would have such crops as radish, lettuce, spinach and other vegetables ready for use early in the season, would find the hotbed or even the cold frame, of great advantage. By the use of the former warm weather crops, such as peppers, egg plant and melons, can be hastened in the spring so as to ensure their maturing before cold weather sets in in many parts of Canada.
While heating manure has to be used with hotbeds for raising the temperature, the cold frame depends upon the sun shining through the glass sash to warm up the soil and start growth. 
W. A. KERR

The late Mr. Kerr was the eldest son of Mr. Wm. Kerr, Chatham. He received his early education at Chatham Grammar School, and graduated from the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, with the degree of B. A.
Deceased studied law in St. John for upwards of a year, and then went to Minneapolis, where he had built up a large and remunerative law practise.
He was City Magistrate for Minneapolis for several years and at one time was mentioned as a candidate for the U. S. Senate. He was prominent in athletics and won several medals at college for long distance running.
