KAISER WILLIAM.

indications that he has entered a state of Pronounced Delirium.

London, April 13. — The Emperor William, it is reported on good authority, has entered a state of pronounced delirium. He has become abnormally suspicious of persons surrounding him, and constantly exhibits a childish eagerness to be before the public in imperial state and to perform royal duties. His mania renders him almost intractable to the attending physicians. They find themselves compelled to resort to all kinds of sedatives in order to deceive their patient into accepting the discipline absolutely necessary in his present enfeebled condition. It is said that one of the principal medical advisers of the Emperor has been ordered by him into disgrace because the prudent doctor, in the exercise of his zeal, found himself compelled to resort to a white lie for the purpose of preventing his Imperial Majesty from imprudently enjoying a drive when too weak to bear the exercise. The doctor on the occasion referred to induced the Kaiser to spend the day indoors by misrepresenting the state of the thermometer and the barometer. indications outside. William did not discover the deception until the next day, when he learned from a non-posted visitor that the weather of the previous day had been simply delightful. This information made the Kaiser furious, and he at once forbade the offending doctor to ever enter the Imperial presence. The fact that such deceptions as the above are found necessary by the court physicians, and that the order of expulsion is secretly ignored, indicate plainly how far advanced is the old Emperor's childishness.

Of course the authorities officially deny that the aged Emperor is seriously ailing, and busy themselves in making many official declarations that he is rapidly recovering. But all these official announcements may be set down as attempts of statescraft to hide the disagreeable truth, which is, that the Emperor is far on the dangerous side of the line of decadence. He is at present suffering greatly from the insomnia that set in during the congestive chill that prostrated him last Tuesday, and which kept his attending physicians desperately engaged at his bedside all that night.

THE DYNAMITERS.

The Stuff Used in Recent Outrages Made in America.

LONDON, April 14.—Col. Majendie, in his report on the recent dynamite attempts, says that the agent used was lignin dynamite, a substance made in America, the manufacture of which is not licensed in England. Further proof of its being American make, he asserts, is found in the fact that slabs of the material have been discovered, the paper wrappings of which are marked "Atlas Powder company." He says the clocks used in the infernal machines are also of American make, and the pistols were of a type common in America. It shows that lignin dynamite was a component of the infernal machine imported in Malta from Bavaria in 1881, and was the agent of the explosion in Possil park, Glasgow, and at the office of the London Times in 1883; that it was a component of the machine found in Liverpool on April, 1883, and of the cartridges found in Primrose Hill tunnel January last.

PARIS, April 14.—Owing to the information obtained through the recent arrests of Fenians in England, an English inspector is coming here to search for dynamiters.

Not "Brawling" but "Prowling."

The Reform organs all over the country have echoed the phrase used by Mr. Fraser in referring to the "brood of bribe-brokers who were hatched out under the aegis of the Mail building." They all use the phrase "brawling brood." There was no brawling in the matter. What Mr. Fraser said was the "prowling brood," and the appropriateness of the word is so apparent, that it is a wonder that such a mistake as "brawling" has been so generally adopted, even for the alliteration. The stenographic outlines of the two words are identical, and no doubt it was the idea that alliteration was intended that caused the mistake.—[Toronto Telegram.]
