Treapsey and St. Mary's intend voting the straight ticket for Sullivan, Carly and Summers and we ask Placentia Bay to do the same.

BOND CAN'T LOSE.

GREENSPOND, To-day.

W. P. Coaker arrived here yesterday evening. A flotilla of 10 motor boats filled with men met him at Puffin Island. They kept circling the motor boat P.P.U. and firing guns until she reached the wharf. Practically the whole population was on the government wharf, the F.P.U. wharf and vicinity to welcome him. A fusillade of joy guns kept up firing from the time the P.P.U. motor boat turned Puffin Island until long after he had landed. Such reception was never given any man here during the life time of the oldest inhabitant. Representatives from Shambler's Cove, New Harbor, Loo Cove and Safe Harbor, joined in the demonstration. Cannon also belched forth a welcome: flags, banners and mottoes were flying from numerous poles. At Bond, here, where 11 flags welcomed the Tories, 27 poles were dressed to welcome Coaker and his colleagues. The grand arch, covered with mottoes, trimmed with natural flowers and surrounded with a small boat with sails set, bearing the words "Can't Lose" was erected in the centre of the harbor. The candidates landed immediately on their arrival at 4.30 and proceeded, at once to the Fishermen's Hall, being saluted on the way by continuous firing. The public meeting started as soon as the hall was reached. Abbott, Winsor and Coaker spoke in the order named. By the time Abbott was half through his speech, the hall was crowded to overflowing. All three candidates were cheered to the echo. Not the least interruption or disturbance of any kind during the meeting. On rising to his feet on the call of the Chairman, Coaker had to wait some minutes for the cheering to subside, before he could commence his speech. At every point made re-nowned cheering broke out and enthusiasm reached the highest pitch ever known in politics here. Counting Greenspond, Shambler's Cove, Loo Cove and Safe Harbor, the Union Party are sure of three-fourths vote.

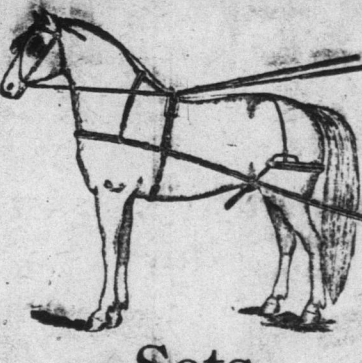
