

Guilty of Razor-Cutting.

FINED \$40 OR TWO MONTHS.

The case of unlawfully cutting and wounding with a razor, Hubert Tizzard, "Old Parican," preferred against Felix Bransfield, a pedlar, of Carbonear, was continued in the Magistrate's Court, before Judge Knight, yesterday afternoon. As already told in the Telegram, the prisoner pleaded "Not Guilty" to the charge. The examination and cross-examination of witnesses was continued. The case of the prosecution as advanced to the court was that Bransfield visited Job's wharf, where schooners were lying, between 9 and 6.30 o'clock on October 1st, for the purpose of selling some razors, watches and rings. Tizzard, who came ashore on the wharf from the schr. Rambler, was accosted by Bransfield and asked if he wanted to buy a razor. Tizzard told him "to go home with his razors." Subsequently, or five minutes later, Bransfield went off the wharf. Tizzard, who stated in his testimony, that as he was going ashore soon after, to pay a visit to his sister, he saw a man, whose features he recollected to be that of the pedlar, standing in Job's Cove. In passing near Bransfield, Tizzard testified that he was seized by the back of the collar, before he was aware, slashed with a razor on the back of the ear, then tripped and cut in the back a couple of times.

The evidence of the accused was to the effect that he went on board a schooner and asked the men to buy his goods. Bransfield said he was told to get to—up off of the wharf by Tizzard and others. Accused said he replied "you have no authority to turn me up." Bransfield further testified to some unbecoming language used by Tizzard and three or four companions. Accused retorted "go to school to complete your education," and "ye act like savages." Then he walked off the wharf quickly as he heard the sound of feet tramping like men running. After coming through the wicket leading to Job's Cove, Bransfield said he was accosted by the men he had not words with a few hours previously. Soon he was surrounded by four men and attacked by (one) man, Tizzard, who was flourishing a stick over his (Bransfield's) head. Accused said he told the men to go away as he did not want to have anything to do with them. They refused, and he drew from his pocket a razor and opened it with the intention of frightening his assailants. Then, said Bransfield, Tizzard seized me and I seized him. We were wrestling for a while and in some unaccountable manner the wounds were inflicted. He (Bransfield) swore that he did not know Tizzard was cut until he saw the blood stains on the razor which was taken from him at the police station, following his arrest. After speeches had been made by Mr. Squires for the prosecution, and Gibbs, K.C., for the prisoner, His Honor, Judge Knight, taking into consideration also the facts and circumstances detailed, imposed a fine of \$40 and costs or two months; that half the fine was to be given to Tizzard who was injured. We understand the costs in connection with the case amounted to \$100.

The newly elected officers also spoke thanking the club for the honour conferred on them, and assured them of their intention to promote the best interests and general welfare of the Association. The rooms are now in first class condition, which was done under the superintendence of Mr. A. H. Salter, who was unanimously re-elected to the post of Sec.-Treas. The curlers intend to promote a series of game during the coming season, and the proceeds of same will be applied to some charitable cause.
