Blundering Finance.

The 1913 Budget Made a Deficit of \$300,000.

The Budget is the topic which is dominating the minds of everybody. The fact that the Minister of Finance has to transfer \$110,000 to a loan account of money yet to be raised and to provide an extra \$100,000 before June 30th to meet an anticipated deficit, has made folk realize the effect of the extraordinary financing of the past few years. These two efforts show that the Minister was having to meet a full deficit of \$300,000. But the gravity of the situation is better understood by the Government's proposal to raise next year at least \$650,000 by extra duties. As we have already shown, allowing for the drawbacks on sulphur for Grand Falls and the placing of crude petroleum used on motor boats employed in the fisheries and in trade, this shows that some \$400,000 of additional dollars of taxation is going to be taken from the people next year, more than the \$350,000 taken off.

The Sealing Bill

We are pleased to find that the Legislative Council put the Sealing Bill through its second reading, and we congratulate the Hon. Mr. Job, who is in charge of the bill in the Upper Chamber. Mr. Goodridge's motion that the further consideration of the bill be deferred until the Joint Committee on the Fisheries report was voted down by 11 to 2. We agree with the opinion offered by Robinson who deprecated that move, as tantamount to the rejection of a bill, which merited immediate consideration, in view of the early departure of the fleet.

The debate afforded an opportunity of discussing the state of the fishery. The following memorandum was used by Mr. Harvey in the course of his speech on this phase of the fishery and the following points made by him, according to Mr. Robinson's summary in the Daily News.

A SOCIALIST STATE.

New Zealand has the reputation of being one of the most progressive countries in the world. There is practically no poverty which is not the result of laziness or drink. There are no millionaires and no slums. New Zealand is two-thirds the area of California. It has a European population of 1,000,000 almost wholly of British descent, and a Maori population of about 40,000.

The laws of these islands have become known throughout the world because of the advanced reforms they are supposed to promote. Primary education is free, secular and compulsory up to a prescribed standard. With free books, free travel on the railways for the children attending school, and where there are no railways an allowance for conveyance by vehicle or ferry or for board of pupils in the vicinity of the school.

Lives of infants are protected by taking them from hard and unnatural conditions and placing them with approved private families. There is a national endowment of 9,000,000 acres for education and old age pensions, besides 2,000,000 for special purposes of various educational institutions.

Public utilities are either nationalized or municipalized, including railways, harbors, postal and telegraph service, parcel post, postal savings banks, street cars, telephones, gas, electricity, water and other things. There are nearly 3,000 miles of railway and only 29 miles are owned privately.

\$7,000 Damages for Death.

By Strange Mishap to a Long Island Resident.

New York, Feb. 13.—The tip of an open umbrella in the hands of William H. Heuscher touched a low hanging electric light lamp one night while he was walking through the park to his home in Jamaica, L.I., and Heuscher was shocked to death by the current which passed down the steel umbrella rod.

The New York and Queen's Electric Light and Power Company contended Heuscher's death was due to his own carelessness, but a jury today decided otherwise and awarded \$7,000 to Heuscher's widow.
