War News.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, June 28.

The French Government report that

the Germans have succeeded in ob-

taining a foothold on the road be-

tween Abain and Angers on a front

of slightly over two hundred yards.

There has been very fierce fighting on

the heights of the Meuse and in Ar-

gonne. The Germans were repulsed

with heavy losses.

The Russian Government reports

successful counter-attacks in Galicia

in the direction of Zolkiew and Lem-

berg and on the Dnieper. Over three

thousand prisoners and many ma-

chine guns were captured. After a

stubborn resistance on the Boborka-

Zurawno front, the Russians are fall-

ing back, having captured about six-

teen hundred and fifty prisoners dur-

ing counter-attacks. Severe fighting

proceeds in the Caucasus.

Report from the Italian front is sat-

isfactory.

BONAR LAW.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, June 28.

The French War Office this after-

noon gave out a report as follows:

The Germans last night delivered two

attacks against our positions, each

of which was repulsed. One was at

a trench of Calonne and the other was

at a point to the east of Metzeral.

With these exceptions there is noth-

ing of importance to report.

CARRANZA IN CONTROL.

WASHINGTON, June 28.

An official announcement of the

occupation of Mexico City by Carran-

za troops under General Gonzalez,

reached the State Department to-day.

CAPTURED SUBMARINE.

MONTREAL, June 29.

The Allan, Liber Granplan, which

arrived here this morning, reported

that when off the Irish Coast, she

passed three British trawlers making

their way to port, towing a German

submarine which was floating head

up. The undersea craft was floating

too low for her number to be made

out. Where the submarine was cap-

tured or under what circumstances,

no one had any idea.

GERMAN DIPLOMATS VISIT VIENNA.

BERLIN, June 28.

The visit of Chancellor Von Beth-

mann, Holweg, and Foreign Minister

Von Jagow to Vienna, was not caused

by any change in the political situa-

tion, according to the Frankfurter

Zeitung, but was merely for the

purpose of discussing questions bear-

ing upon the efforts of the Entente

Powers to win over the Balkan States.

ITALY TAKES PART IN DARDAN- ELLES.

BERLIN, June 28.

The Italian newspapers are jubilant

over the announcement that Italy is

to participate in the operations

against the Dardanelles by sending

her fleet, under the Duke of Abruzzi,

to release the larger British warships

for important work elsewhere. A de-

claration of war by Turkey is said to

be considered imminent. Rome news-

papers are quoted as expressing the

belief that Italy's action will signify

a new era of politics in the Orient.

ALBANIAN HARBOR OCCUPIED.

BERLIN, June 28.

A telegram received here from

Scutari, says the Montenegrins have

occupied the Albanian Harbor of Gi-

ovani Veda, and are now marching

on Alessi.

READY FOR GERMANS.

PETROGRAD, June 28.

Officers of the Russian General

Staff now state that they have satis-

factorily achieved the regrouping of

their forces necessitated by the Ger-

man Galician campaign, and that

they stand ready effectively to oppose

the further advance of Austro-Ger-

man forces in Galicia.

GERMAN REPLY FAVORABLE.

WASHINGTON, June 28.

A favorable reply by Germany to

the last American note regarding sub-

marine warfare, was indicated in to-

day's State Department advices from

Berlin. The advices came from Am-

bassador Gerard and were notable as

being the first of any definite nature

received since the American Note

reached the German Foreign Office.

GERMANS GETTING GENEROUS.

LONDON, June 29.

Herbert C. Hoover, Chairman of the

Committee for the relief of

Belgium, has concluded an agree-

ment with General Von Bissing, the

Military Governor of Belgium, pro-

viding that the wheat and rye crops

in the zone occupied by the Germans

shall be reserved for the civilian popu-

lation.

ITALY BREAKS WITH TURKEY.

PARIS, June 29.

The announcement was made by

the French Ministry of War to-day,

that according to the Italian press, It-

aly has broken diplomatic relations

with Turkey. Italy, it was added,

would send troops to the Dardanelles.

FRENCH BARQUE SUNK.

LONDON, June 29.

The French barque Dumfriesshire,

which sailed from San Francisco on

January 22nd, for Dublin, with a car-

go of mail, was sunk to-day by a

German submarine. The crew landed

at Milford Haven.

GETTING AFTER ASQUITH.

LONDON, June 28.

Premier Asquith's anxiety for the

statement in his speech at Newcastle

on April 20th, that neither Britain nor

her allies was hampered by a lack

of munitions, has been demanded of

the Cabinet Leader in the House of

Commons this morning. His refusal

to give any information on the sub-

ject was met with the assertion that

his statement was absolutely without

foundation. Sir Arthur Markham,

who raised the point, angrily charged

the Premier with perverting the

truth, and said the original statement

cast a slur upon Sir John French,

who was in no way responsible for it.
