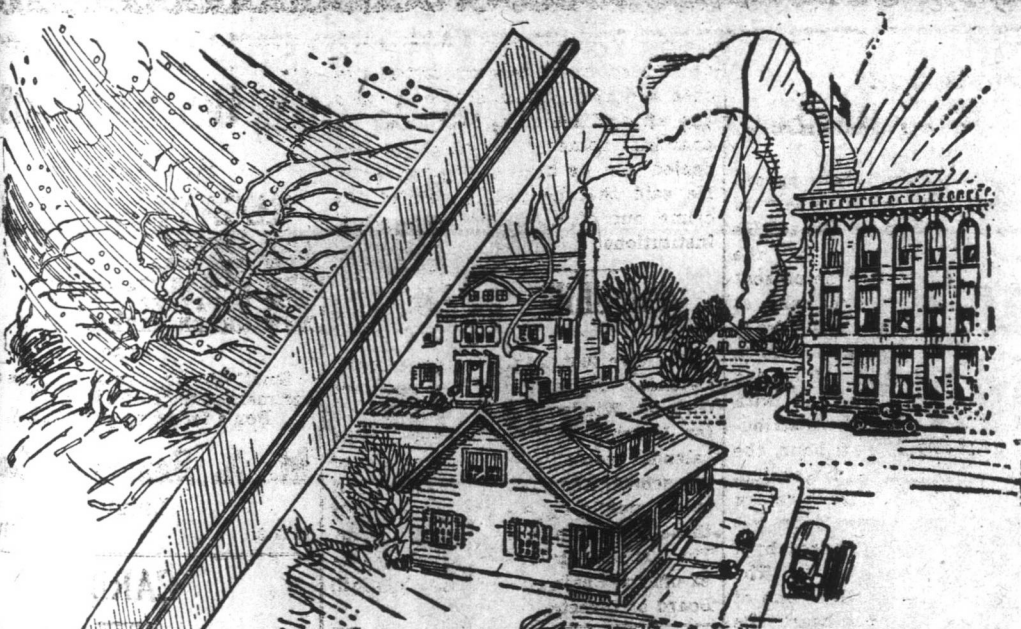

In Memoriam.

CHARLES R. DUDER.

"For what shall we mourn, for the premature loss, the sheltered young green wood?" For the eagle that died in the tempest, after from its eyrie broad.

The remains of the late Charles R. Duder were interred in their last resting place, Thursday in the General Protestant Cemetery at Riverhead. Rev. Robert J. Power, M.A., St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church officiated at the home, assisted by Rev. Dr. Fenwick. An immense concourse of citizens followed the hearse to the cemetery. The deceased was probably one of the most widely known Newfoundlanders. There was scarcely a business man in the island but had to do with him in his many sided career. As a youth he entered the office of the late Edwin Duder, an uncle, who at that period conducted the largest fishery business in the colony. After separation from that business the merchants of this colony held such a high appreciation of his abilities that they sent him as Newfoundland agent to Brazil, where he was director and adviser on fish shipments totalling 400,000 qts. a year of a value of \$2,500,000. In this arduous and complicated employment he by his tact and ability removed many causes of grave irritation and was the means of placing this our largest and best foreign market on a sound financial basis. The job was a big one and Mr. Duder filled all its requirements. After his return from Brazil he took over the management of the Standard Manufacturing Co. and in this new sphere he scored an unqualified success. His business reputation was untarnished. His word was his bond. In social life he was paramount. At balls and dancing parties he was the Prince of Charm, and at the head of the dining table in the Masonic Club rooms he was the imposing host that made all parties a case and happy. His bonhomie, his kindness, his tact will long remain a fragrant memory to the brethren of the mystic tie. As billiard player, cricketer, skater, curler, angler, regatta man and field sportsman, he was known and beloved by all those who delight in these glorious pastimes, and wherever the votaries of these sports assemble his form will be recalled up in sad sweet memory.

Charles R. Duder, wherever he went, carried the contagion of his warm sunny character. The cricket field of 30 years ago was the summer attraction of the city whenever the Terra Nova cricket team clashed against the Mechanic or Shamrock. Mr. Duder participated in these titanic struggles both as batsman and bowler and was among the most efficient of these athletes. Of late years angling and curling became his almost exclusive recreations and he excelled in both. It was his devotion to the former cult lost him his life at Ocean Pond.

To his sorrowing widow and family the sympathy of the whole community goes out. The blow must be a terrible one to his amiable wife and family. Time alone can assuage this sorrow, but it must be a source of consolation to know that thousands of sincere friends mourn with them in their bereavement.

How a Continent is Measured.

Until lately no great continent has ever been measured up by means of the surveyor's chain. Maps are usually made by means of astronomical calculations similar to those used by the sailor in fixing his position at sea. These calculations are found to be amazingly accurate when they are checked by the measure.

When, more than a century ago, the French instituted the metric system, they were very anxious that the metric should be an exact fraction of the earth's circumference—which the yard is not.

They therefore checked the astronomer's calculations by actually measuring the distance in a straight line from the North to the South of their country. When the work was finished it was found that the two sets of measurements differed only by a few feet!

To-day a far greater piece of measuring is being undertaken. Thanks to the construction of the Cape-to-Cairo railway, the whole length of the great African continent is being worked out by surveyors. Considerable portions have already been finished, and these show us that up to the present at any rate there is no need for us to revise our maps.

An error has been disclosed, it is true, but it is hardly of the kind to affect the atlas. It amounts to a matter of feet to rather less than one inch for each hundred miles. Not a very serious mistake!

When the measurement is completed—as it will be before long—it is expected that astronomers and surveyors will differ by about 50 yards for the entire length of this immense continent.

Where Will the Prince Live?

WHITE LODGE MAY BE HIS RESIDENCE.

LONDON, (Canadian Press)—Since the return of the Prince of Wales from his tour in the East, the question of his residence, both in London and the country, has been under serious consideration. No decision has yet been reached, and it is probable that his Royal Highness will retain his present rather modest establishment in York House, St. James' Palace, at least for the present. Queen Alexandra has indicated that she is willing to relinquish the possession of Marlborough House in favor of the Prince of Wales at any time, but he has declined this offer, adding, characteristically, that he "would probably get lost in the place." It being "miles too big" for him. Therefore, until such time as he marries, it seems safe to say that the Prince will not become the occupant of Marlborough House. The question of a country residence for the Prince of Wales has been debated since the war at considerable length. Years ago the hope was expressed that he would ultimately have a home in his Principality, and both the King and the Prince at one time considered this. It is probable that the Prince will shortly take over White Lodge in Richmond Park, where he was born 22 years ago. The present occupant in the veteran Viscount Farquhar, to whom the place was lent some years ago.

EDWARD HAS SIMPLE TASTES.

Another residence which the King would like to see occupied once more is Frogmore. It has been without a tenant the greater part of the present reign. Shortly after King Edward came to the throne, Frogmore was thoroughly rearranged and brought into line with modern requirements, and the present King and Queen stayed there with their young family on several occasions.

It was at one time suggested that Frogmore should become the home of the Earl and Countess of Athlone, but they much preferred their smaller and more compact home in the Henry III. Tower of the old castle. The Prince, however, the pointed out that, for the next year or so at all events, he would be only able to pass a few weeks at Frogmore annually. His tastes are extremely simple, and he admits that he has no desire to be saddled with the expense of a large residence that would of necessity be closed for the greater part of the year. Next winter, the Prince, no doubt, will lease temporarily a hunting-box in some county where he can enjoy several days sport whenever he can spare the time from his many duties, and several residences of this description have recently been brought under his notice in the hope that they will prove suitable. It is possible that when the Prince acquires a house of this nature he will have his brothers, the Duke of York and Prince Henry, as his co-tenants, since all of them are devotees of the chase.
