WARSHIP CEREMONIOUSLY

SCUTTLED. SYDNEY, N.S.W., April 11. With solemn ceremony the veteran warship Australia was sunk to-day twenty miles off Sydney, in accordance with the naval programme under the Washington Treaty, laden with hundreds of floral tributes from the populace. The warship was tow-St. John's, Nild. ed to the scuttling point by tugs accompanied by the Australian and five British cruisers with officials aboard. There her sea valves were opened and she slowly settled beneath the water while the cruisers fired salutes and airplanes circled overhead.
