

PROCLAMATION

mond Allardice,

in and over the Colony of
Newfoundland.

WHEREAS it is provided by "The
John's Municipal Act, 1921," that
the Mayor and six Councillors elected
under the said Act shall hold office
for four years beginning on the first
day of January next ensuing after
the election;

AND WHEREAS an election was
held under this said Act on the first
day of December, 1921,
and the Mayor and Councillors then
elected will expire on the thirty-first
day of December next;

I do, therefore, by and with the
advice of my Council, issue this Pro-
clamation declaring to all whom it
may concern that the Nomination of
candidates for the said Election shall
be held in St. John's on Saturday,
the twenty-eighth day of November next,
and that a Poll shall be taken on Tues-
day, the eighth day of December,
next.

I do further give notice that
the said Election shall be conducted
in accordance with the provisions of
"The John's Municipal Act, 1921,"
and "The Election Act, 1913."

Communists in Jail Following Raids on "Reds"

BRITISH GOVERNMENT HARD ON
HEELS OF MUTINY ADVOCATES
—NATION AROUSED.

LONDON, Oct. 15.—(A.P.)—The
British Government is hard on the
heels of the communists, whose al-
leged activities in broadcasting pam-
phlets inciting soldiers and sailors
to mutiny, had fed the flames of
popular anger against them.

Raids were made last night on com-
munist headquarters and at least one
other communist centre in London.
Although they were sensational in
their suddenness, it had been sus-
pected by both the public and the com-
munists themselves that they were
in preparation. When the net had
been drawn tight, it was found that
a considerable number of the follow-
ers of the red banner, were in the
toils, some of them of considerable
prominence. All of them are charged
with conspiring to incite sedition and
mutiny.

Home Secretary Hicks, in respond-
ing to the outcry of anti-communists
during recent speeches, made no
secret of the fact that the Govern-
ment was taking a serious view of the
situation and was prepared for re-
pressive action if it found a "strong
case against the reds." The difficulty
in dealing with the extremists, Mr.
Hicks said in a speech at Liverpool,
was that they were British subjects
and, as such, entitled to the Govern-
ment's protection as long as they
did not pass the very narrow line
which separated what was constitu-
tional and what was unconstitutional.

It is known that the Attorney-
General and the Solicitor-General for
some time have been investigating
Communist activities and it was pre-
sumed that they now have decided
that the Reds have passed over the
"narrow line" to the "wrong side."
Whether the incitements to mutiny
actually were due to the Communist
party or to individual Communists
acting independently, is yet to be
proved.

Acted Quickly
It has been charged unofficially,
against the communists, that they
have been preparing a campaign of
violence with a view to terrorizing
the public and undermining confi-
dence, and also that they were ar-
ranging to bring alien criminals from
various parts of Europe, to aid in
carrying out their plans.

Last night's raids seemed to have
been decided on quickly. Warrants
were obtained in private, from the
Bow Street Magistrate, and the Scot-
land Yard men acted so swiftly and
secretly that hours passed before the
news leaked out. It is asserted in
some quarters, that in addition to
headquarters and the other Commu-
nist center raided, in London, several
private houses in London and some
in the provinces, also were invaded
by the police.

The police chose an auspicious mo-
ment to swoop down on headquarters
for most of the leaders were there.
Particularly notable was the arrest
of Albert Inkpin, secretary of the
Communist party, who has been one
of the most active workers in the
Communist movement since its be-
ginning here. He has been secretary
and national organizer of the party
since 1920, and for some time one
of the honorary presidents of the Com-
munist International.

John Campbell, editor of the Work-
ers' Weekly, who also was taken into
custody, is credited with being the
brainiest man in the party. He has
been in the public eye before when
he was tried in 1924 on a charge of
inciting to mutiny. Campbell escaped
conviction, and it was said, this was
because the Labor Government of
Premier MacDonald refrained from
submitting evidence it had against
him.

Harry Pollitt, another under-
standing, is an energetic public speak-
er and often has been in the news.
He belongs to the Red International
of the labor unions.

E. Cant, a party organizer; W.
Rust, secretary of the Young Com-
munist League, and P. H. Winfrin-
ham, a member of the staff of the
Workers' Weekly, are among others
who are said to be in jail.
The six Communist leaders, taken
in the raid on the party headquarters,
were arraigned in the Bow Street
police court to-day and charged with
conspiring to incite sedition and mu-
tiny. They were remanded until Oc-
tober 23, on bail of £200 each. The
court room was packed, the specta-
tors including the wives of four of
the accused men. Sir Archibald Rod-
kin, Dictator of Public Prosecutions,
was at the counsel's bench, while Sir
Travers Humphreys briefly outlined
the case for the prosecution.

Thomas Bell, a Communist, has
been taken into custody at Glasgow
and William Gallacher, at Paisley.
Both are being sent to London.
