


ber works in the Lange Ve Household aide. TENTING SERDS.—Now that spring and the planting season are approach-ag, it is often important to test the itality of seeds before sowing them. Ve have heard the following simple and asy method described : Fill a box, pan r flower pot partly with the rich, hellow earth, make the upper surface parfectly smooth, and on this surface in a straight cross lines, and drop a seed at each intersection, so that they may be easily counted. Then take a wide hoop or frame, and make a bettom to it with a cloth stretched across, so as to resemble a size. Place this upon the seed, and fill it with enough fine mold to from a sufficient covering for the seed, which should generally be four or five times the diameter of the seed for the depth. Keep the soil sufficiently moist and in a warm place. The size can be lifted easily and the seeds examined without disturbing them. In this way corn, wheat, clover seed, turnip seed and many other thinds can be easily tested, which may be bt considerable importance where the age or featness of the seed is not certainly known.— *Country Gentleman.*

Granty IN IRELAND, -The Mark Lane Express says the cause of the ill success of cereals is easily accounted for; beyond a doubt it is to be ascribed to the humidity of the climate, produced by its exposure to the influence of the At-lantic Ocean, and the continued rainfall and fogs to which it is liable. It is not that more rain falls in Ireland than in England, but the general humidity produced by light rains on a greater number of days, causes the a mosphere to be in a continually damp, and chilly state, very unfit to promote the matura-tion of corn. It is, in fact, necessary to the safety of the wheat when in itend-ed for shipping to kiln-dry: thefore putting ito board, and the actice is generally followed by the matura, to prevent the cargo from heating. The perfect ripening of wheat requires, ac-cording to Board, and the average daily heat in summer of 58 degrees Fahrenheit, provided this degree of tem-perture is minitained during the day, the cold of the night does not affect the ripening process. But in Ireland, with a damp and cloudy atmosphere, (its nor-mal condition) the consequence is that the cered products do not arrive at full maturity before they are harvested, and if required for shipping soon after, must be kiln dried to be made safe.
