CONCERNING HEALTH and BEAUTY  
By MRS. HENRY SYMESHOW TO HAVE  
BEAUTIFUL ARMS

BEAUTIFUL arms are almost a necessity now that nearly all the gowns are cut with short sleeves, and the woman who possesses lovely rounded, smooth, white arms may justly be proud of them.

It is to her less fortunate sister that my talk is addressed today. The girl with thin, bony arms, unlovely elbows and rough, red skin needs only to spend a few minutes every day in the care and treatment of her arms to soon be able to wear with grace the elbow-length sleeve or an evening gown with short puffs over the shoulders.

The first stage in beautifying the arms is to wash them perfectly clean in warm water, using a pure white soap and a soft flesh brush for the elbows and the skin on the outside of the arm both above and below the elbow.

Now rub into the skin a good cold cream and massage firmly but gently, rubbing up from the wrist to the elbow and from that point to the shoulder. By pressing the flesh with the two forefingers of the hand, use a rotary motion for muscle massage the entire length of the arm.

You can make your own cold cream, for which I give the formula:

**Kentucky Cold Cream**

Rowspan 4 ounces  
Almond oil 4 ounces  
Sweet almond oil 4 ounces  
White wax 1 ounce  
Add the rosewater slowly, so that it will mix well.

The elbows can be very greatly improved by soaking them for a few minutes in olive oil, and then massaging them very thoroughly, both with the arm outstretched and with the elbow bent. Do this every day for a month and note the improvement.

Before you retire for the night apply the following lotion and pull on long gloves that will cover the elbows. The warmth thus created will open the pores of the skin and allow the lotion to be absorbed more quickly; it also helps to whiten the skin.

**Cucumber Lotion**

Expressed juice of cucumbers 1 pint  
Diluted alcohol 1 pint  
Sweet almond oil 1 ounce  
Shaving cream or melted castile soap 1 ounce  
Add 1 dram  
Blended almonds 1/4 dram

**Dry Lips**

Rub the lips at night with warm water and glycerine. Do not pass the tongue over the lips, for the moisture is lost.

**Oatmeal on the Face**

Make a thin paste of oatmeal by stirring together the meal and water. After straining through a fine sieve, the hands and face may be bathed with the mixture. Sometimes the paste is allowed to dry on the skin.

**An Ingrown Nail**

Dear Mrs. Symes:—Please tell me what can be done for an ingrown toenail. Can I use anything to make them less brittle?—O.

Scrape the nail at the edge of the toe until it is quite flat. Then use a little of the ointment in the center of the nail's edge. Pack a little absorbent cotton between the sides of the nail and the skin.

**Powder of White Geranium**

Starch powder 1/2 pound  
Powdered iris root 1/2 ounce  
Oil of sweet almond 1/2 ounce  
Crash free from lumps. Add the perfume a little at a time.

**To Remove a Scar**

There are some scars which can never be removed. However, it does no harm to try to remove them. You may apply a lotion made of sixty grains of borax to a pint of water, and use it as a wash for the face.

**The Eyebrows**

It is the best way to have the eyebrows darkened by using a cosmetic. You may use either an eyebrow pencil or the stain for which I am giving the recipe:

**Chinese Eyebrow Stain**

Gum arabic 1 gram  
Indigo blue 1/2 ounce  
Glycerine 1/2 ounce  
Powder the ink and gum and triturate small quantities of the powder with the glycerine until you get a uniform black liquid in a paste, and use it as a stain.

Their health and happiness are lost. They do not derive any comfort, only care from the presence of the little one. This should not be. A well baby should not nurse the entire time of his mother. He should be able to amuse himself the greater part of the time. He should be trained from the first to go to sleep with no one near, and not require rocking and cooing.

The baby should not be held except when being fed or bathed. The remainder of the time he should lie quietly in bed and require little attention. The more attention one gives a baby the more he requires. This does not mean the baby should be neglected in any way, but he should not be pampered and "spoiled."
