

CROPS ESCAPED HURT BY FROSTS, SAY MOST REPORTS

Correspondents of the Alberta Pacific Elevator Co. Give Definite Data

Harvesters Experience More Trouble From Rains Than Anything Else

Nevertheless, Crops Are All the Way From 20 to 60 Per Cent Cut

That the recent frosts have had very little effect, generally speaking, upon the crops in Alberta is definitely proved by the crop reports of correspondents of the Alberta-Pacific Elevator company. It appears that more trouble has been caused by the harvesters by rain than anything else, but nevertheless, that crops are all the way from 20 to 60 per cent cut.

The reports for the week ending August 31 in detail are as follows:

Calgary North
Beiseker—Heavy frost, about 5 degrees Thursday night. Many fields of oats and barley were far enough advanced and are in good condition. Samples of wheat show light damage if any. Very little winter wheat sown here.

Castor—Rains of the last five days have held harvesting back but it looks as though it would clear up soon without any frost and if it does will come through with the best crop we have had in 10 years.

Edmonton—Wheat cutting delayed by rainy weather. About 40 per cent cutting done. Oat cutting 20 per cent done. Barley 60 per cent cutting done. 20 hours rainfall during week. White frost twice but very light, small garden vegetables not frozen.

Halkirk—Very wet and cold all week, making it almost impossible to cut some of the low places. Fall fell in south part of district and did considerable damage. Light frost Thursday night but have not heard of it doing any damage. Weather cleared up some yesterday. Wheat ready to cut. Oats are ready to cut but a lot of them damaged by continued rain. Barley practically all cut.

Killam—Weather has been bad for harvesting during past week. 40 per cent of wheat cut, shows some frost in places. Oats about 50 per cent cut and will be an average crop of very good quality. Barley all cut but will be damaged some on account of the rain.

Millar—Heavy rainfall this week. Quite a lot of wheat and barley is in the shock but oats not harvested on account of the rain.

Hardisty—Cutting started but rain has retarded it again. Flax not ripening as fast as the wheat.

Provost—Raining last two days and very cold. Grain ripening slowly.

Red Deer—Rain. Barley cutting. Wheat and oats will be ready to cut soon.

Strome—Ground very moist, delaying cutting. Very little wheat cut yet. Oats are turning fine.

Wetaskiwin—Past week has been wet and ended up with about two degrees of frost. Do not know if it has done much damage or not. There is very little cutting done yet in this district, almost impossible to work the binders on the land for a few days.

Calgary East
Strathmore—This week has not been very favorable for the ripening of crops. Had a small hail storm on the 28th but it did not do much damage. This was followed by about 3 degrees of frost, slipping the potatoes, beans and garden stuff.

Calgary South
Barons—Cutting of crop general and weather generally favorable. Light frost reported night of 28th but slight damage to low spots and very green grain.

Blackfoot—Prospects not very good. Heavy frost night of 29th, hard to estimate the damage at present.

Carmanangay—Cold weather with light showers. 2 degrees frost Thursday night but warmed up with south wind about 12.30 Friday morning, no damage done. Harvest of spring wheat about half finished. Some threshing done and grain of good quality. Flax crop this year exceptionally good and grain of good quality.

Cayley—Winter wheat all harvested and some threshed. Sample very good so far. Spring wheat in fine condition and will be of good yield. Some spring wheat harvested. Oats a splendid crop and some early fields already harvested. Barley a very heavy crop, some early fields harvested. Have had some hail but do not see much damage done so far. One inch of rainfall during the week.

Clearholm—Weather conditions during the past week have been ideal and grain has advanced rapidly. Some spring wheat has been cut and harvest will be fairly general Monday. Some threshing of winter wheat will be done the coming week.

High River—Late spring wheat slightly damaged by frost. Some oats being harvested. Barley harvesting is general. Weather unfavorable for harvesting. Electric storms and slight frosts week ending August 31st.

Parkland—Fall wheat all cut. 50 per cent spring wheat cut. 25 per cent oats cut. Light frost on night of the 29th doing little or no damage to standing crop. Threshing will commence latter part of next week.

Warner—Most of the spring grain is cut. No frost to damage so far.

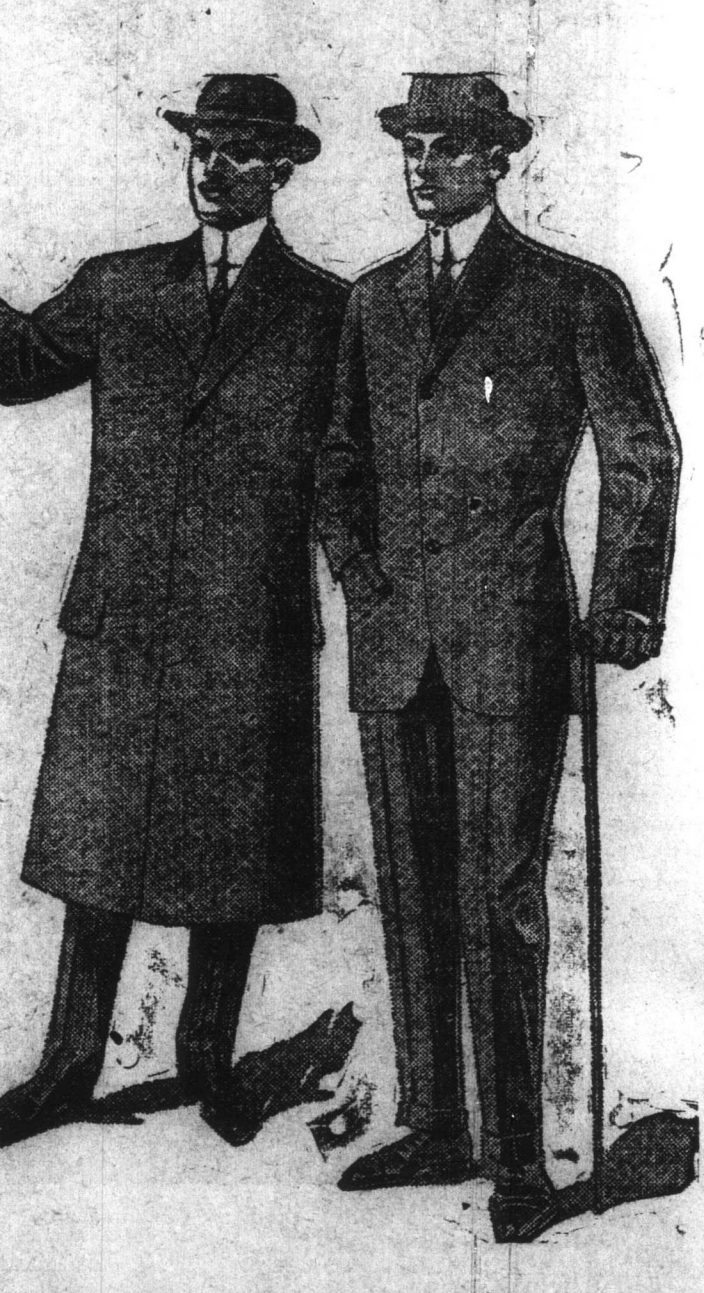
