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Rev. Dr. J. W. MacMillan, of Halifax, presented a report on the training of young men for the ministry. For years there has been a lack of men offering for this work, and three years ago a special committee was appointed to ascertain the reason for the state of affairs and to secure, if possible, a list of names of men who were considering the question of entering the work of the church. Dr. MacMillan reported that a list of 300 names had been obtained, and that the number in the theological colleges was increasing. Suggestions were made with reference to changes in the course of studies in the colleges, one being that students entering on preparating for the ministry late in life should not be required to devote much time to the study of the dead languages. The eight theological colleges of the church reported through a committee, of which Rev. Dr. John Fornest, of Helifax, was the chairman. Manitoba College, Winnipes, was given permission to abelish its preparatory department and to appoint a professor in the thelogical department to give instruction in the English Bible. Rev. E. H. Oliver was continued in charge of the college at Saskaton. The work of the institutions and the Reference was made to the manner in which the various colleges of the church had co-operated with the other colleges of other denominations in the teaching of theology.


