TORONTO, Nov. 24—11 p.m.—The disturbances which covered the lower lakes last night had also traveled the St. Lawrence Valley to the Gulf, where it is now situated. Another depression covers Alberta, and the pressure is highest in the Southwest States. Strong winds and gales have prevailed from the lakes to the Atlantic.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Montreal, 9° below—10°; Qu'Appelle, 0°—10°; Winnipeg, 18° below—18°; Toronto, 34°—43°; Montreal, 35°—43°; Quebec, 38°—49°; Halifax, 45°—55°.

Failed to Cure Himself. JACKSONVILLE, Ill., Nov. 24.—News has reached here that Dr. Andrew McFarland, the well-known insanity expert and proprietor of a private lunatic retreat at Oaklawn, had committed suicide by hanging. He had been suffering from brain trouble for some time, and was doubtless deranged when he committed the deed. Dr. McFarland was appointed superintendent of the New Hampshire Insane Asylum in 1874. He was superintendent of the Central Illinois Asylum from 1877 to 1879.
