Rev. A. Henderson, of Appin, presented the Home Mission report in connection with which the commissioners appointed to visit aid-receiving congregations reported.

Rev. D. K. McKenzie reported having visited Port Stanley, and suggested that a deputation of Presbytery should visit Dexter to present the claims of the augmentation fund with a view that, if possible, they should increase their contributions toward self-support. Rev. Messrs. Henderson and Mackenzie were appointed a deputation to visit Dexter.
