## A Car that Writes.

After 20 years of patient labor and study, Mr. P. H. Dudley has invented a car that writes. It records, slowly or rapidly, the condition of the track over which it travels. A curious electrical machine controls a number of small glass tubes, fitted to a point, that are filled with ink. These tubes trace on paper, specially made, all the variations of the track; where there is a difference of the sixteenth of an inch, the difference is recorded. The sheets of paper, which are eight feet long, pass over rollers that are connected by a series of wheels of the car, and keep the record of each mile of the road traversed. Every curve, as well as alignment and variation of the height of the rails, is recorded; each defect is clearly marked, and it is then an easy matter to locate and repair them. This car is at the home of Mr. Dudley, who owns it. The car is known as the Dudley Dynograph Car.

## Wrecks and the Drowned Sink to the Bottom of the Ocean.

There is a rather common, but erroneous notion, to the effect that a human body, or even a ship, will sink to the bottom of the ocean. It is a common error, but will account of the density of the water at a great depth, remain suspended at some distance below the surface of the earth. This is an error. No other fate awaits the drowned sailor or his ship than that which comes to the marine creatures who die on the bottom of the sea; in time their dust all passes into the great storehouse of the earth even as those who receive burial on land.

However deep the sea, it is but a few hours before the body of a man who finds his grave in the ocean is at rest upon the bottom of the great deep. The body is not service from the agents which, in the order of nature, are appointed to care for the dead, as some to those who are reverently inhumed in blessed ground. All save the hardest parts of the skeleton are quickly taken again into the realm of the living and even those more resisting portions of the body in time are, in large part, appropriated by the creatures of the sea-floor, so that before the dust is in the accumulating water to the firm set earth it may pass through an extended cycle of living forms.

The fate of animal bodies on the sea-floor is well illustrated by the fact that beneath the waters of the Gulf Stream, where it passes by southern Florida, there are, in some places, quantities of bones, apparently those of the manatee, or sea-cow, a large herbivorous mammal, which like the seal, has become adapted to aquatic life; these creatures plentifully inhabit the tropical rivers which flow into the Caribbean Sea, and are thought rarely, found in the streams of southern Florida. At their death they drift into the open water and are swept away to the bottom by the ocean current. For some weeks, perhaps, the carcasses are buoyed up by the gases of decomposition which are retained by their thick skin; as they decay, and break the bodies fall to the bottom. ## Booth and Labouchere.

A press cablegram from London says that the fact that Henry Labouchere recently signed an appeal made by General Booth for funds for the Salvation Army, has occasioned considerable surprise and comment, as he had formerly been understood to regard Booth as a sham. In an interview just published Labouchere explained his attitude, saying that he has satisfied himself that the money raised by Booth is being rightly expended. He says that he recently visited the "Farm Colony" near Hadleigh, and found a very interesting establishment. An enormous work has been accomplished. A complete village had been built up in thirteen months. The colony possesses 300 acres of land under crops, and 1,200 acres of land are being reclaimed from the sea by the dumping of London refuse. Thirty-seven acres are devoted to fruit trees. There are 600 chickens, 600 cattle, and a large number of sheep and pigs. A rabbit warren is a novel and useful part of the stock-raising establishment. The colony also has a sawmill, a brickyard with a capacity of 30,000 bricks per day, a chair factory with a daily output of 600 chairs, and other manufacturing plants.

Mr. Labouchere found the "submerged tenth" working hard, and proving themselves worthy of the help. Booth by the aid of the generous public, has extended to them. Booth's theory, that by giving these poor wretches a little encouragement—a salary they could be redeemed, seems to be substantiated by the results attained. Men are constantly leaving the colony to accept good situations. The moral effect upon the beneficiaries seems like a physical tonic. Labouchere concludes his interview with an honest, fruitful, and successful one.

## Anarchy Effectively Done For in Chicago.

At the headquarters of the West Side police one is in the neighborhood of the "Anarchist Riot" of 1886. In that building the police force was mustered and armed for its march out to the Anarchist meeting-place, 500 feet west and there 67 of the police, killed and wounded, were laid when brought back a few minutes later. The messenger in attendance is one of the severely wounded, now much shattered, to do more than light the way about the station. Conversation with some of the men at this station has led me to a new appreciation of the magnitude of the forces then and there fought out, and the finality of the settlement arrived at. A lieutenant of police recently said to me:

"The whole thing is played out. They will never make an experiment. There is no interest in anarchy or socialism any more, and no meetings to speak of. They do get together, some of them, at Twelfth Street Turner Hall, but they never know that they are ever planned a riot or loaded a bomb. No; they have no connection with hardship and poverty. They can always get their beer, and that's the main thing in their eyes."
