FAIR AND COMPARATIVELY COOL

Toronto, Ont., April 21—11 p. m.—
The depression, which was in Illinois last
night, now covers New York State. The
high pressure has become much reduced,
and a rapid decrease of pressure has taken
place throughout the Northwest. Showers
have occurred in many places in Ontario,
and tonight sleet is falling at Montreal.

Calgary, 22—46; Qu'Appelle, 18—40;
Winnipeg, 26—54; Port Arthur, 34—48;
Perry Sound, 46—56; Toronto, 46—66;
Ottawa, 36—42; Montreal, 34—56; Quebec,
28—40; Halifax, 36—56.

PRACTICAL GEOGRAPHY.

Washington, April 22.—In the Senate
