London, Thursday March 18.

—The Provincial elections take place in Nova Scotia to-day.

—Many members of Parliament expect the sittings which begin to-day to last after midsummer. The members are to be commiserated.

—With the opening of the Dominion Parliament the Opposition theatricals at Toronto may be less protracted. Mr. Martineau and Mr. Whitney must be very tired threshing over old straw.

—Dr. Duncan, of the United States, suggests that smallpox may be due to sun spots. If there is not certainty regarding the origin of the disease, the Provincial election campaign will not close till Dr. Ryerson has attributed it to wicked Sir Oliver Mowat.

—The new British Premier refuses to be bulldozed. In his first speech after attaining the leadership he spoke plainly. "Lord Salisbury," he said, "wants us to appeal to the country. We are not afraid to appeal to the country when we think the time is ripe, but we shall never concede to this hereditary assembly the right to force dissolution." "Never" is an excellent word in that connection.

—It is figured out that if the whole of the British metropolis is peopled as thickly as St. George's district now is—that division is the most sparsely inhabited—the population of London at that time will be 30,000,000! London is not a city of houses. Official agricultural returns show that over 14,000 acres under cultivation, 812 acres in wheat and 2,840 acres under green crops. Practically within sound of Bow Bells there are 600 cattle, 5,000 sheep and nearly as many hogs kept on farms.

—In response to many inquiries, the Methodist Book and Publishing House, Toronto, announce the early issue of a volume memorial of the late Dr. Douglas, of Montreal. The book, to which Dr. Potts is contributing an introduction, will contain a biographical sketch and a number of selected sermons and addresses. Its publication will no doubt be awaited with interest by the many friends and admirers of the eloquent divine, whose noble life has just closed.

—The new British Premier has consented to deliver an address at the Scottish Liberal Conference in Edinburgh, on Saturday next. Not since Mr. Gladstone swooped down on the bold Baccellach's preserve of Midlothian has an address fraught with so much importance been made in the Scottish capital. Being St. Patrick's Day, some people are expecting a speech especially pertaining to Irish affairs. The nature of the occasion, we believe, will bring forth a general discussion by the Premier of the Liberal programme as a whole.

—We direct the attention of the Dominion Postmaster-General to the interesting innovation which France will soon adopt in the postal card system. The cards will be issued in the form of check books, with stubs; the sender can make memoranda of the contents on the stub, and can have this stamped at the postoffice before the card is detached, so that a verified record of the correspondence may be kept. What a revenge a long suffering creditor can have on a debtor, able to pay but unwilling, by sending in his bill in this manner!

—As was to be expected, Mr. J. L. Hughes, grand master of the Orangemen, endorsed the P. P. A. in his annual address.

dress, Mr. Hughes, as is well known, is first and always a Conservative politician, and he readily recognizes the aim of the projectors of the latest anti-Catholic organization. In London and elsewhere these leaders are working, tooth and nail, to make their association a donkey engine to the Provincial Conservative machine, with the object of securing the defeat of Sir Oliver Mowat, who is himself a Presbyterian elder and a better Protestant than they can name as being in their ranks. The animus of Mr. Hughes' address throughout is apparent. He makes it quite plain that, professed strong Protestant though he is, he is ardently desirous of securing the defeat of Sir Oliver Mowat, while he is ready to work for the continued success of Sir John Thompson. How sorry Mr. Gladstone will be to learn that Mr. Hughes rejoices over his retirement, and welcomes with honeyed words the advent of Lord Rosebery. As the new Premier has hitherto endorsed the policy of Gladstone in its entirety, and has reaffirmed his determination to stand by the programme in future, one fails to see why Britain's Grand Old Man should lie awake at night devising means to pacify the irreconcilable Toronto dominie.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT TO-DAY.

Partly by luck and partly by manipulation, Sir John Thompson meets Parliament, on its assembly for the session of 1894 this afternoon, with only two fewer followers than sat behind him last year.

Where seats were rendered vacant, as in Winnipeg, they were captured by the Liberals, solely on their unassailable tariff platform. Hence the Administration not being ready to show its hand, refrained from opening any seats that could possibly be avoided, and it so happened that only two members on the Conservative side were removed by death.

The conditions were so critical that though several of his parliamentary following were promised offices, and the public service is suffering because the offices are left vacant, Sir John Thompson has not dared to open these places. How long this distrust of the constituencies will continue remains to be seen. The striking fact at present is that it exists and cannot be removed unless the tax system now in force is radically changed. We much fear that when the promised changes are brought down, as they must be soon, they will be such as not to give much hope to the populace.

EX-GOVERNOR ROYAL'S CONFESION.

Hon. Joseph Royal, late Lieutenant-Governor of the Northwest Territories, and a leader of the Conservative party in Canada, publishes a pamphlet in which he discusses the political situation with an admixture of contention regarding the position of his co-religionists. Though not agreeing with D'Alton McCarthy, another dissentient Conservative, on this point, Mr. Royal is at one with the member for North Simcoe in conceding that the "N. P." system of trade restriction is a thorough failure. Canada, he contends, needs most of all an ample market. He maintains that the best, because the nearest and largest market for Canadian producers, is the United States; that the British market is far inferior to it in point of importance, and that in order to be able to avail themselves of the United States market on the best possible terms Canadians should be in a position to make their own trade arrangements with foreign countries. For this reason this Conservative leader advocates Canadian independence. No doubt, Canada will be a nation in due time. But if Mr. Royal and those members of the Conservative party who believe with him are in earnest regarding the disadvantages of a "protective" tariff and its corollary of trade restriction, they will not wait for the declaration of Canadian independence before they set earnestly to work for trade emancipation. We can vastly add to our trade freedom with the United States as well as with Great Britain if we put in power a government at Ottawa which honestly favors a policy that will work towards enabling us to buy and to sell as freely as is possible consistent with the collection of the revenue necessary to economically govern the country. Hitherto, the men in the pay of the combines have held sway, and have thwarted every genuine move towards obtaining near and profitable markets. We hope that Mr. Royal has not been put up by them to start a new issue so as to divert attention from the task of the immediate future. Sensible Canadians will not consent to thrust out the political destiny of this country at this time if the effect is to permit the continuance of the policy of blundering and plundering at Ottawa. Their primary duty is to get rid of the restrictionist bosses. Then the work of tearing down the trade barriers will be comparatively easy. In accomplishing this task there should be cordial co-operation among all loyal Canadians, no matter what their party affiliations may have been.

MR. CLANCY'S KICKING.

THE BARNACLES MUST GO.

The indorsement of Mr. Labouchere's motion to abolish the veto power of the House of Lords, which was the sensation of the British House of Commons on Tuesday night, was not a defeat of the Government. It was simply a strong manifestation of the Radical views of the British people. Every Government in that country must go forward and abolish all class privileges that operate unfairly.

What is being done in the motherland must be copied in Canada, or improved upon, as the circumstances demand. One of these days the Liberals of the Dominion will be in power at Ottawa. They will be in the majority in the popular chamber, as we believe they now are in the country. Will they submit to have their measures emasculated and destroyed by a so-called upper chamber, the large majority of whom owe their position to one of two causes—(1) they were rejected by the people when they sought election to the popular chamber; or (2) they had proved themselves to be the willing agents of the men that gave them the office?

To permit a set of men so made up to thwart the passage of good Liberal legislation would be simply intolerable. The Dominion Senate, as at present constituted, is nearly as repulsive to the correct views of popular government as is the House of Lords. And if, when the Liberals come into power at the next general election, it attempts to prevent the speedy passage of progressive Liberal legislation, the demand for its mending or ending will be so great that it will be brought about with a speed that will astonish the barnacles.

THE WAR IS OVER.

No one will regret that the Brazilian war is over. There is in that country a population of between 15,000,000 and 20,000,000 persons, and, as a result of the row between President Peixoto and Admiral Da Gama, a civil war has prevailed for many months, paralyzing business within the Republic and injuring trade between it and its many customers on both sides of the Atlantic. The election of a new President took place the other day, but that was not the chief reason for the capitulation of Da Gama. He was hemmed in in the harbor of Rio Janeiro by the fleet purchased by the Brazilian Government to take the place of the vessels with which he revolted. To seaward were these powerful warships and torpedo boats; on the land were the Government-manned forts. Da Gama had to fight or surrender. He chose the safest course, as the chances were strongly in favor of the sinking of his ships if he had resolved to combat the odds against him. The people of Brazil will much discredit republican institutions upon this continent if, when Congress meets in May, they do not at once set about making arrangements whereby parliamentary or other domestic questions may in future be settled without the costly arbitration of arms. Bloody methods of settling disputes should be left to the savages.

One good effect of the cessation of the hostilities will be a revival of British trade. When commerce is uninterrupted between the two nations they have a trade of over \$50,000,000 a year with each other. It is needless to say that the war has had an injurious effect on international barter.

What will be the fate of the discomfited insurgent admiral is not known. Had he been successful the cry on the streets of Rio de Janeiro to-day would be, "Viva Da Gama!" As it is, the cry is, "Viva Peixoto!" Such is the fortune of war. If you are successful, you are a patriot; if defeated, a rebel.

MR. HYMAN, M. P. IN HAMILTON.
