Who Newcomers have taken liberties with the book, a common offense in those days of hastily staged best-selling books, but as it has a story of its own, such as it is, that

pleased with the vaudeville attractions, which are really good and provide a first-class evening's entertainment. The concert soloist, Miss Jones, was an especial favorite last night and was repeatedly cheered. The Ellis-Nolan trio of comedy acrobats, also came in for a share of well deserved applause.
