At Proposed Sale Fanning Island by Home Goverment

Sydney, April 14.-The greatest indignation is expressed here over the report that Fanning Island, one of the most important landing stations of the "All-British" Pacific cable, together with Washington Island, is to be offered for Drives Away That Tired, Run-Down sale by public auction on April 17 next. It is regarded here as nothing less than a national scandal that the Imperial Government should run the risk of such an important strategic center as Fanning Island falling into the hands of a foreign

power. The "All-British" Pacific cable, as it is well known, links up Vancouver, British Columbia, with New Zealand. In this billtated.
