MOUNT RAINIER SPITTING FIRE
Smoke, Ashes and Rumbblings from Volcano in Washington State.

MOUNT RAINIER
Tribune from North Yakima, Washington, says: The smoke issuing from Mount Rainier is seen plainly from here although the mountain is over 90 miles away. The mountain has been emitting fire and rumbblings for three days. The first reliable report reaching here yesterday from a prospector camping near there and driven away by the fearful rain of ashes.

In his letter Jack Campbell, the prospector, says: "Rainier began to smoke Monday evening. On Tuesday it was worse. Wednesday ashes and red hot mud fell into camp. Rumbblings were heard and I had to move. Thursday sulphurous smoke hung over the crater. The rumbblings are growing more noticeable and are felt ten miles from the base."

Two years ago there was evidence of eruption, but not nearly so severe as the present one. There are no residents near the mountain, but coal prospectors are beginning to flee.

CHICAGO CANAL FIGHTS NIAGARA

Protests Against Effort to Preserve Falls That Will Limit Water.

Washington, D. C., April 11.—Chicago is so vitally affected by the scheme to preserve Niagara Falls that the sanitary district has protested formally against its adoption. The protest has come from President R. R. McCormick in a letter to Senator Cullom, as chairman of the committee on foreign relations of the Senate, asking that the drainage district be allowed an opportunity to make a statement in opposition to the proposal to limit the diversion of the lake water to the Chicago drainage canal to 10,000 cubic feet per second.

Mr. McCormick states that such a limitation would be harmful to the interests of the city. Senator Cullom wrote to Mr. McCormick stating that his committee will consider the scheme to preserve Niagara Falls at a meeting to be held on Wednesday, and that it will be glad to have him appear and make an argument in order to demonstrate how Chicago may be affected by the plan recommended by President Roosevelt. Mr. McCormick is expected to reach Washington tomorrow.

The scheme President Roosevelt wants adopted is that formulated by the American members of the international waterways commission for the preservation of Niagara Falls. It was submitted to Congress last year. The President at first contemplated the negotiation of a treaty with Great Britain for the preservation of the falls, but Secretary Root came to have immediate legislation, and the President suggested that a law should be put in such form that it would lapse at the expiration of three years, provided during that time no international agreement should be reached.

In accordance with the President's recommendation, the foreign committee of the Senate has called upon the American members of the international waterways commission to submit a draft of a bill, and it will be presented tomorrow. It will contain provisions as follows:

1. Authorizing the Secretary of War to grant permits for the diversion of 2,500 cubic feet of water per second, and no more, from the waters naturally tributary to the falls, distributed as follows: Niagara Falls Hydraulic Power and Manufacturing company, 800 cubic feet; Niagara Falls Power Company, 800 cubic feet; Erie Canal, or its tenants, in addition 800 cubic feet per second.

2. Prohibiting all other diversion of water which is naturally tributary to Niagara Falls, except such might be required for domestic use or for the service of locks and navigation canals.

3. Imposing penalties for any violation of the law.

4. The law to remain in force for three years, and then to continue in force, until the meantime the Canadian Government shall have enacted legislation prohibiting the diversion of the water which is naturally tributary to Niagara Falls, in excess of 2,500 cubic feet per second, not including the amount required for domestic use or for the service of locks in navigation canals.

Gen. Ernest, chairman of the American members of the commission, claims that the Canadian Government has appropriated an ample supply of water to the Chicago drainage canal for all present use and for the future. He states the present amount of water admitted to be diverted into the canal from the lake is only 4,200 cubic feet per second. The canal now has a capacity of 5,000 cubic feet per second.

Gen. Ernest suggests that for Illinois and the people of the middle west to build a canal for navigation purposes, the depth of which shall be greater than the depth of the Erie Canal, is the greatest scheme under the United States. He and other persons who are interested in maintaining the Niagara Falls in its present glory neglect to consider, however, the effect upon Chicago of a limitation of the water supply of the canal.

GAPON A FAKIR, SAYS M. GORKY

Famous Leader of Russ Revolt Is Charged With Being Bribed.

New York, April 12.—Father Gapon, the Russian priest, who made an effort to organize the workmen to revolt, was declared today by Gorky, the Russian novelist and radical, to be a fakir. He said: "Gapon, if he had been killed on the day of the massacre in Moscow, he would have died a hero, unfortunately, he lived to be bribed and to betray the cause of Russian liberty. The Socialists, after their defeat from Russia, made an investigation of his conduct and found that he had accepted through a secret service officer of the Government 100,000 roubles, from Witte himself 60,000 more, and from other sources 50,000 more."

Gorky has the impression that the result of the election to the Duma, a majority of liberal deputies would be eventually a revolution similar to the French. He believes that it is the duty of the Socialists to stand on their rights, and that will be the signal for the revolt.

Gaylord Wilshire today gave Gorky a letter he had lately received from Frances Evelyn, Countess of Warwick.

MADE IN IRELAND
Hibernian Home-made Goods Crowding Our Imported Article.

Dublin, April 11.—The report of the Irish Industries' Association of Cork is full of interest this year. It shows that the industrial propaganda can be pushed forward, not by generalities, but by attending to details. The energetic secretary of the society, Mr. Riddan, by prompt action, prevented an order for iron girders going out of the city.

"A local firm, whose books have just been audited," says the report, "informed the council that their wages bill had increased \$4,500 during the past twelve months. This is accounted for by the fact that during the period they manufactured a considerable number of articles which they previously imported. This took place under the stimulus of local industrial patriotism."

A large English firm of soapmakers has been giving away half-pound samples of their soap to Irish housekeepers during the past few weeks. One of their representatives stated that it was necessary as their trade in Cork had been badly hit owing to the demand, which existed for Irish-made soap.
