BURGLAR'S LAIR RAIDED

Port Arthur Police Have a Pitched Battle With Thieves.

Port Arthur, June 19.—A pitched battle between police and burglars ensued this morning, when Sergt. Fenn and Constables Thurlow and Symens went down the short eight miles to the beach, where the burglars, who have lately been operating in the two cities, and made a number of hauls. The gang scented the approach of the officers, and fled along the shore, emptying their revolvers at the police. The police returned the fire. None of the officers were hurt, but it is not known whether any of the gang were wounded. The police found a large quantity of burglars' tools, dynamite and all kinds of goods supposed to have been stolen, which they brought back to the city. A posse will be sent down by rail to look of the men, who will in the meantime be refused permission to board any trains should they be passing.

PLUNGED INTO ABYSS.

Vancouver, B. C., June 20.—In a disaster which overtook the Seattle and Vancouver passenger train on the Great Northern Railway, Engineer Zeigfeld and Fireman Brown perished. A misplaced switch on the Fraser River bridge at New Westminster threw the engine off the track and it plunged over the bridge into the river. Not a single passenger was injured. If the brakes had failed twenty people would have lost their lives. As it was the end of the mail car overhung the abyss with forty feet of swift-flowing Fraser running below.

WILD SCENES ON PARIS RACE TRACK

French "Reds" Carry War Into the National Pastimes.

Paris, June 20.—An occurrence unprecedented in the history of the French turf prevented the running of the Grand Steeplechase of Paris today at the Auteuil course. The meeting was disorganized and a serious accident took place, in which several persons were injured and many arrests were made.

Inspired and aided, it is stated, by Pettaud and revolutionary labor leaders, 40 militant members of the Stable Boys' Union, which was organized at the time of the postal strike, armed with revolvers, ambushed the vans conveying the horses from Maisons Laiffite, their training quarters, cut the traces and forced them back to the stables. Among the victims were several American horses.

In the meantime, owing to the delay in calling on the events, the greatest confusion prevailed at the race track. It was a long time before the cause of the appearance of the horses became known, but finally a regiment and a force of police set off in automobiles to the scene of the trouble, while they succeeded in putting the stable boys to flight and rescuing the racers.

It seemed at first as though the meeting would have to be abandoned and President Fallieres, who is always present on the occasion of the Grand Steeplechase, was advised, by telephone not to come to the track. Eventually, however, the call was given for the first race. This was more than two hours after the scheduled time and the crowds, already exasperated from waiting, became violent when a single horse presented itself for a walk-over in the first event. The horses were forced to beat a hasty retreat at the paddock, as the crowd swarmed on the track and refused to permit the jockey to take his mount over the course. The second event was for army officers, riding their own horses. For some reason or other the crowds became frenzied when several officers cantered out for the start. The officers were pelted with missiles of various kinds and two were quite severely injured. The barriers guarding the course were broken down and hundreds of men invaded the track, several of them being ridden down and injured by the wildly excited horses. About the same time the booths and stands were set on fire, but fortunately forces of police, troops and firemen, who had been hastily summoned in time to clear the track and extinguish the flames. The police made a large number of arrests and the remainder of the programme was carried out in comparative quiet.

At a meeting tonight, which was attended by delegates from the general federation of labor, the Stable Employers' Union voted to strike next Sunday, when the Grand Prix de Paris is the feature of the racing programme. One of the speakers announced that 30,000 workmen would co-operate in the strike and Grand Prix would be converted into an obstacle race.

EXCLUSIVE BOOKINGS OF GREENWALL CIRCUIT

Agreement Between American Theatrical Exchange and the Syndicate.

New York, June 21.—For many weeks, in conjunction with the "open door" or gates-ajar policy, there have been rumors that a change in the theatrical conditions of Texas and the southwest was imminent. To the experts of the theatrical world a change of alliance on the part of the leading theatres in that section signified something of a revolution in the general theatrical situation. However—one can almost hear the "open door" creak—the routing map of the Theatrical Syndicate will not be altered as far as Texas and the southwest are concerned, as an agreement has been reached yesterday between Albert Weis, of the American Theatrical Exchange, and Klaw & Erlanger, whereby the latter are given the exclusive bookings of the Greenwall theatrical circuit and of all the other territory controlled by the American Theatrical Exchange. This territory embraces every city in Texas except El Paso, all the houses in Oklahoma, and the cities of Little Rock, Pine Bluff, Hot Springs and Helena in Texas. The agreement is for a term of ten years.

In other words, the "open door" in that region has closed with a bang, and it is doubtful if the most expert cracksmen could pick the lock.

When A. L. Erlanger, the syndicate's war chief, was seen on this subject, he merely remarked:

"None of the parties having a real interest in the situation has been worrying about it in the least. Our relations with the American Theatrical Exchange always have been exceedingly friendly. We have maintained silence, because that is a part of our policy, and one can accomplish so much more without expending energy in mere conversation. We did not wish to impede the flight of the theatrical hot air balloons that have been circling around New York lately. What is the use of puncturing a fake story in May when one can do it just as well and more leisurely in June? Furthermore, it should be remembered that July and August remain before the theatrical season opens."

ENTIRE RUSS TOWN WAS ON BIG DRUNK

Frightful Story of a Debauch From Siberian Wilds.

180 FROZE TO DEATH

Those Left All Confirmed Drunkards, and Many Victims of Delirium Tremens.

St. Petersburg, June 21.—A dispatch from Irkutsk tells of the finding of 180 bodies of men, women and children in a Siberian village. The 180 people froze to death while in a state of beastly intoxication during a blizzard two months ago, and communication with the village has only now been resumed.

The bodies were found in the streets in ditches, in deserted homes, in barns, everywhere, the natives, about a thousand, either exhibiting the utmost indifference or defied the authorities. An investigation showed that most of the natives are suffering from delirium tremens, while the rest, men, women and children, are confirmed and habitual drunkards. It appears that some two months ago a convoy of Government vodka (potato whiskey), some 25 barrels, passed through the village, and was ambushed by the natives. They killed the officials and drivers, took the horses, burned the cars, and then set to work drinking up the Imperial liquor, which is about the vilest concoction in the world.

As stated, 180 perished while drunk in a snowstorm, but the rest of the villagers continued their carousal, all drinking to their full capacity day in and day out. As a consequence, the natives are either insane with drink or on the verge of delirium.

The Government investigators who visited the village in the course of their routine duties, say they encountered unheard of conditions, even for Russia. Business was entirely at a standstill. There had been no spring plowing or seeding, the live stock roamed at large or had been eaten. Those natives that were not fighting were lying about in a stupor, boys and girls of the age of from 5 to 6 drank vodka like water and the smell of vodka was on the breath of the very babies.

The governor of the province sent physicians and nurses to the village, but they reported back that it was necessary to make the whole population prisoners and cart them off to hospitals for treatment. The St. Petersburg Government has been asked to furnish the funds on the ground that the village, in former years, used to buy a hundred thousand rubles worth of vodka per annum.

Some of the liquor taken from the convoy was 90 per cent alcohol. This was drunk up with the rest by the population. To make it more palatable the Siberian peasants added some red pepper.

MRS. GOULD'S JOURNEY HELPS THE REBUTTAL

Finds Conditions at Philadelphia Hotel Refute Testimony by Foreign Maids.

New York, June 20.—Mrs. Howard Gould, accompanied by J. T. Sturdevant, of Lawyer Clarence J. Shearn's office, arrived over the Pennsylvania Railroad shortly after 2 o'clock today from her trip to Philadelphia. Mrs. Gould refused to say anything about the purpose of her trip or what had been accomplished, but no attempt was made by Mr. Sturdevant to conceal that it was for the purpose of refuting testimony given by the two employees of the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel in Philadelphia with regard to Dustin Farnum.

Mary E. Harrison and Florence Garner, formerly floor clerk and maid at the Philadelphia hotel, have so far given the most damaging testimony in the Gould case. That Mrs. Gould and her lawyers realized this fact was evinced by Saturday's hurried departure for Philadelphia, where Lawrence Maresch, assistant manager of the Bellevue-Stratford, was sent for and had a long talk with Mrs. Gould.

The hotel register for October, 1906, at which time the Farnum-Gould party was at the hotel, was brought to Mrs. Gould's room on the same floor as that occupied by her during the first visit. The numbers of the rooms occupied were taken, and then Mrs. Gould and Sturdevant started out to ascertain if they could see with their own eyes all that the two former hotel maids testified they saw.

The room occupied by Dustin Farnum, which was two floors below that occupied by Mrs. Gould, was the first point of attack. Sturdevant, it is said, tried to see if he could locate a room entered by a person at the far end of the hall from where the floor clerk sat. To spot the door was hardly possible, and it is understood that witnesses will be brought on from Philadelphia at the proper time to testify that Farnum's bed could not be seen, and it would be impossible to tell whether it had been occupied by a glance from the doorway.

On the floor on which Miss Harrison had her desk, Mrs. Gould's floor, another test was made. Miss Harrison testified that she saw Farnum leave Mrs. Gould's room at 7 o'clock in the morning. She said she saw him leave in a mirror placed over her desk. What Mrs. Gould or her attorney found out relative to this could not be learned, but from the jubilant appearance of both it was to be inferred that

ADVANCED THOUGHT

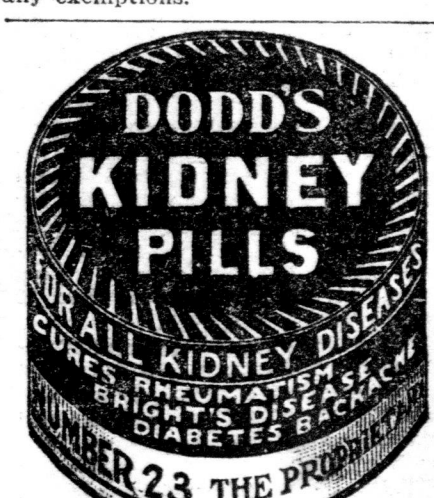
Fair Attendance at the Meeting Held on Sunday.
