A BY-LAW

To prohibit the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in the Municipality of the Township of Lobo.

The Municipal Council of the Township of Lobo hereby enacts as follows:
1.—That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in and shall be prohibited in every shop, inn or other house or place of public entertainment in the said municipality, and the sale thereof, except by wholesale, is and shall be prohibited in every shop or place other than a house of public entertainment in the said municipality.
2.—That the vote of the electors of the said Township of Lobo will be taken on this bylaw by the deputy returning officers hereinafter named, on Monday, the third day of January, 1910, commencing at 9 o'clock in the morning, and continuing until 6 o'clock in the afternoon at the undermentioned places:

3.—That on the 27th day of December, A. D. 1909, at the Town Hall at Coldstream, in the Township of Lobo, at the hour of 10 o'clock in the forenoon, the electors shall assemble in writing, signed by John H. Irvine, two persons to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this bylaw, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this bylaw.
4.—That the Clerk of the Municipal Council of the Township of Lobo shall attend at the Town Hall at Coldstream, at the hour of 11 o'clock in the forenoon on the fifth day of January, A. D. 1910, to sum up the number of votes given for and against this bylaw.
5.—This bylaw shall come into force and take effect as from the first day of May next after the third passing thereof.

THIRD SUNDAY IN ADVENT

Was Observed in Anglican Churches Yesterday.

Subject of a Sermon by Rev. Mr. Malott on Sunday Night.

"The Meaning of True Manhood" was the theme of Rev. F. E. Malott's special sermon to young men at the Colborne Street Methodist Church last night. Mr. Malott pointed out that in all ages, there has been a standard of manhood, and if we can judge from the prophets and other writers, true men have always been very scarce. Their value to a nation is unquestionable. True man, Mr. Malott stated, would be courageous, honorable, gentlemanly, and would have great faith. He urged all his hearers to strive after these things, and showed that they are all found in Christ, the perfect man.

Little Wardell Wray, of Forward Avenue, who fell some weeks ago and broke his leg, is still detained in Victoria Hospital as a result of the fracture. He is reported today to be doing nicely. The fracture is healing as well as can be expected, but he will not be able to get out for some weeks yet.

The Mothers' Club of the Empress Avenue School of West London, will hold their meeting to-morrow evening, instead of Thursday night, originally intended. A large turnout of members is requested.

Mrs. Boyd, of Roger Avenue, West London, has purchased a handsome red brick residence on Surrey Avenue from Mr. Pugh, and will move in in the near future. Mr. Pugh is now living on Cherry Street, where he will reside until he completes his residence on Wilson Avenue.

The gang of gas company men who have been laying mains in West London for some weeks are now using more elaborate means than have been used since their arrival in the West End. The earth has become so solid they find much difficulty "picking" their way through West London.

The "T" for the hydro-electric poles have arrived, and have been distributed through West London. The work of placing them on the already erected poles will be commenced immediately. A passerby remarked to a man who was wrestling with one of the poles that the work was very heavy. 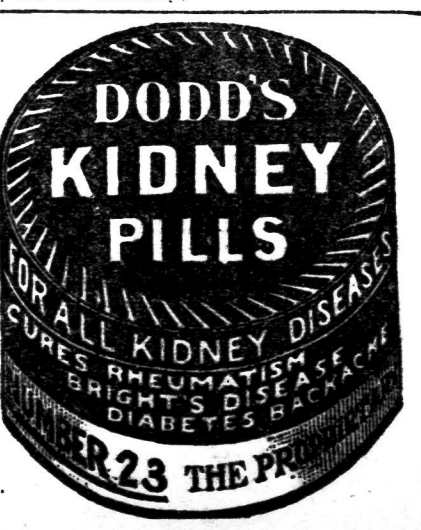
Mr. Alfred Glead, 24 Alexander Street, West London, has sufficiently recovered from his recent severe illness to allow his attention to his duties once more.

FARM CONVENTION.

Rome, Dec. 13.—The general assembly of the international institute of agriculture, representing 46 states and colonies, met here yesterday. Count Palma, president of the institute, greeted the delegates who numbered more than 100, after which Senator Bodie was elected president of the assembly.

A motion was introduced by one of the delegates to admit the press to the sittings, which heretofore have been closed. Italy, Chile, Peru and the United States supported the motion, while France and Ecuador, claiming that the assembly had no right to change its standing orders, which did not contemplate the presence of newspaper representatives. It was decided by vote, however, that the assembly was entitled to change its own standing orders, and also that the motion be referred to a committee of five to report on Monday.



BISHOP EVANS WILL TAKE PART IN DEBATE

Latter Day Saints and Christadelphians Will Settle Points of Difference.

There will be an interesting debate in the Latter Day Saints Church on Maitland Street this evening, as a result of an argument that has arisen between the leaders of the Latter Day Saints and the Christadelphians. Bishop Evans, of Toronto, formerly of this city, and one of the highest Latter Day Saints in this country, will champion their cause, while Mr. Phillips, of Guelph, one of the leaders of the Christadelphians, will speak for them. Each man is to have a half-hour to speak, and the debate will continue for four nights. One of the questions to be debated is the statement "That the Bible teaches that there is in man an immortal spirit, which continues to live in a conscious state after the death of the body." Bishop Evans will take the affirmative and Mr. Phillips the negative. This question will be debated tonight and tomorrow night. On Wednesday and Thursday nights the question, "That the Bible teaches that the wicked, depraved and heathen, have no immortal spirit, and that they will be annihilated at death, and they will never have part in a resurrection," will be discussed. Mr. Phillips will take the affirmative in this and Bishop Evans the negative.

CRONYN MEMORIAL THIRTY-SIX YEARS OLD

Special Services Were Conducted on Sunday—Some Church History.

The 26th anniversary of the opening of the Cronyn Memorial Church was celebrated yesterday by special services conducted by Rev. Charles J. James, pastor of the Church of the Redeemer, Toronto. The Memorial Church was completed in the fall of 1873, and was formally opened on Dec. 11 of that year, in charge of Rev. Harrison Tilley, son of Sir Leonard Tilley, one of the fathers of confederation. It was the gift of the members of the Cronyn family, including Mr. Verschoyle Cronyn, K.C., Benjamin Cronyn, Mrs. Edward Blake, and the late Mrs. Samuel Blake, in memory of their father, the late Bishop Cronyn, who came to London in 1822, as the first missionary of this diocese. In 1835 he was appointed rector of St. John's parish in London. Toward the end of his life he was given the Memorial Church on the occasion of its opening, and has been in use there ever since. On the death of Rev. Mr. Tilley, the church was given to the Rev. C. C. Owen, now of Vancouver. Several years ago Canon Dyson Huxley, the present rector of St. Paul's, was his assistant rector, Rev. John Morris.

CANADA WORKS AMERICAN CASH

Some \$226,800,000 Are Now Invested by U. S. Capitalists in Dominion.

Washington, Dec. 12.—In a report just received by the state department it is disclosed that the total American investments in Canada now reach the colossal sum of \$226,800,000. This is divided as follows:
\$90,000,000 in British Columbia
\$50,000,000 in Ontario
\$50,000,000 in Manitoba
\$30,000,000 in Alberta
\$20,000,000 in Saskatchewan
\$10,000,000 in the Northwest Territories
\$10,000,000 in the Yukon Territory

Notwithstanding that Canadian banks have more than \$200,000,000 on deposit in the banks of New York, says the report, Canadian development seems to attract more naturally to Philadelphia, Boston and London. It was thought that capital which developed the water power and industries around Sault Ste. Marie. It was Boston capital and enterprise which developed the Dominion Coal Company, the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, and the Shawinigan power.

In mines, lands and lumber the greatest amount of United States money is finding its way to Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia. The other day, 40 miles north of Victoria, 50,000 acres of timber land were sold to an American concern for \$200,000. Recently San Francisco interests purchased for a million dollars the controlling interest in 20,000 acres of timber and coal lands on Graham Island. A further American States capital into the Kootenay district of British Columbia occurred during the past few months in the opening of coal mines by Minneapolis and Spokane men; the acquisition of the Highland-Buckeye-United mines group near Ainsworth by New York people; the purchase of the Pike mines also by New Yorkers; the Queen mine by Duluth people and the Lucky Jim mine by men from Spokane.

Among the capitalists who are going into Canada are the United States Steel Corporation, the Standard Oil Company, James Cronin and Heinze of copper fame, and the Guggenheim interests with their Morgan backing. While much of the money these people take across the line is put into mines and timber, vast sums are also invested in commercial enterprises. The Regina and Saskatoon flour mills, especially, immense investments have been made in distributing warehouses for agricultural implements in which nearly every American manufacturer is interested. Immense manufacturing concerns from Wisconsin, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio and Iowa have enormous branch establishments not only at Regina and Saskatoon, but at other strategic points throughout the Canadian grain belt. They do an immense business in harvesting machines, binder twines and threshing outfits. The Saskatchewan flour mills, a tremendous concern, are owned by Americans or at least backed by American capital. And it is also interesting to note that the telephone system in Moosejaw, purchased by Americans, was four months ago sold to the Saskatchewan Government.

NEW AIR MARVEL
This Aeroplane Can Travel at 120 Miles Per Hour.

Worcester, Mass., Dec. 12.—The Telegram published the following today:
Working quietly away from the scenes of public controversies and with the eyes of aeronauts busy in other fields, Wallace E. Tillinghast, vice-president of the Sure Seal Manufacturing Company, has invented, built, and tested what he says is an aeroplane capable of carrying three passengers, with a weight limit of 200 pounds each, a distance of at least 300 miles without a stop to replenish the supply of petrol, and, if necessary, at a rate of 120 miles an hour.
Mr. Tillinghast states that on the night of Sept. 8 he went in his aeroplane to the Statue of Liberty, near New York City, then to Boston, and back to the starting point without alighting.
Mr. Tillinghast says that when near Fire Island one of the cylinders of the

fliter ran irregularly, so the motor was stopped with the machine 4,000 feet in the air, and sailed 26 miles while two mechanics repaired in midair, the engine being started again when the aeroplane was near enough to land to be seen by a member of the life-saving crew patrolling the beach.
