ing cigars without regard to the cost to the province. (Laughter.)

The department of mines had been so well administered, concluded Mr. McKee, that not a word of criticism had been levelled by the Opposition at Hon. Frank Cochrane or his methods.

Liberals Blazed the Trail.

Mr. Mayberry (Liberal, South Oxford), regretted that he had not the eloquence of Hon. J. A. Matheson in Opposition. Without it he was unable to fitly describe the appalling increase in Ontario's expenditure. The Liberal party had always blazed the trail of progress in Ontario, and it was upon the foundation laid by the Liberals that the present prosperity was built. The Liberals favored cheap power, and had frequently proven the fact. He claimed, however, that the Government had not dealt equitably with the farmers in buying easements. He knew of one farmer who was offered \$300, but who stood out and received \$1,000; another who received \$250; and others who were paid \$475, \$200, \$500, and \$1,120, respectively. Some who had the fewest towers placed on their land received the most money. Mr. Mayberry did not think the Government could justify the differences in these sums. CANADA LIFTS GERMAN SURTAX

The Kaiser's Government Climbs Down and Concedes Minimum Tariff.

PROVISIONAL AGREEMENT

New Trade Arrangement Signed at Ottawa Yesterday by Two Governments.

Ottawa, Feb. 16.—The tariff war between Germany and Canada, which has been in progress since November, 1903, involving on the part of Germany the penalizing of Canada by the placing of all the products of this country on the maximum tariff list, and on the part of Canada the placing of a surtax of 25 per cent against imports from Germany, is a thing of the past. Germany has come down, and at the instance of the German Government the tariff reductions between the two countries have now been placed on the same footing as they were prior to the imposition of the surtax.

The Agreement Completed.

Just prior to the adjournment of the Commons last night, Hon. Mr. Fielding presented copies of an agreement entered into today between Dr. Karl Lange, Imperial German consul for Canada, representing the German Government, and the minister of finance, on behalf of the Canadian Government, providing that on and after March 1, 1910, Canada shall withdraw the surtax against Germany, in return for the admission by Germany to this country of Canadian products now marketable in the country at the German conventional tariff, or minimum rate.

The differences between the two countries is brief, that after the granting of a preferential tariff to Great Britain by Canada, in 1897, the British Government denounced a number of its colonial trade treaties, including the treaty with Germany, which provided that no other or higher duties should be levied in the British colonies on the products of Germany than on the products of the United Kingdom.

The Surtax.

These treaties were terminated on Aug. 1, 1898. After that date German goods were entitled to admission into Canada under the minimum tariff. Germany resented this state of affairs and imposed upon Canadian products the higher duties of the German tariff. The Canadian Government remonstrated against what was deemed an injustice to Canada, pointing out that the tariff relations between the United Kingdom and the colonies were matters of domestic concern, which no foreign Government could reasonably interfere. Germany, however, refused to accept this reasoning and Canada retaliated by applying to the products of Germany the surtax authorized by the customs tariff of 1897. This surtax of one-third over and above the duties specified in the general tariff was brought into effect on Jan. 28, 1904.

The New Schedule.

The schedule of the new tariff is as follows: Canadian products to be admitted into Germany at conventional tariff rates. Wheat and split barley, oats, red cloverseed, white cloverseed, all kinds, cloverseed and grass-seed, all kinds. Fruits—Fresh apples, pears, quinces; unpacked, packed, apricots, peaches, plums of all kinds, cherries, mazzards, medlars, strawberries, raspberries, currants, gooseberries, blackberries, myrtles, juniper berries and other edible berries. Dried or kiln dried (cut up and peeled or not)—Apples and pears, including waste culls for use; apricots and peaches, plums of all kinds, loose or in casks or sacks weighing at least 50 kilos, gross weight; packed in any way; other dried or kiln dried fruits. Timber—Sawn longitudinally or prepared in some other way, not planed; hard, soft, wood for casks (staves and headings) of wood roughly shaped, recognizable as these articles, not planed or planed; of oak, other hard or soft wood. Horses—Horned cattle (live weight), sheep (live weight). Meat, excluding bacon—Fresh, even frozen, simply prepared, prepared more delicately for the table. Marine crustaceans, living or not, including those merely boiled or salted, whether shelled or not; lobsters and crayfish (gross weight). Greases and grease-like fats (hogs' lard, goose grease, beef marrow, oleomargarine and other analogous fats). Meal, baked or roasted or not; meals of grain, excepting oats; meal of malt
