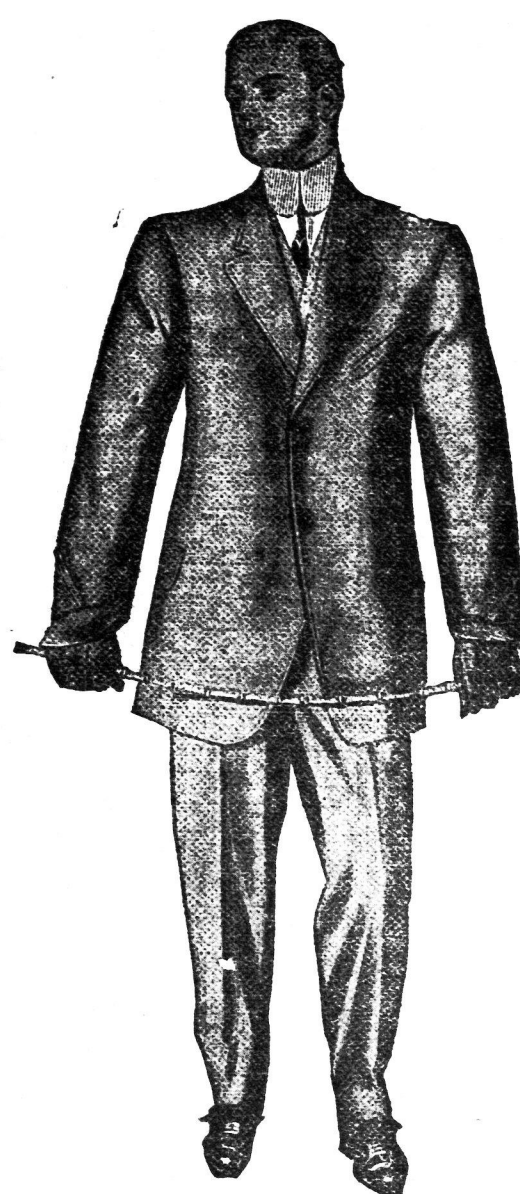

VESTRY MEETINGS**The Adjourned Sessions Were
Brought to a Conclusion
Last Night.**REPORTS SATISFACTORY**Progress and Stability Are Shown All
Along the Line—The Statements
Presented.The adjourned vestry meetings of
all the Anglican churches of the city
were held last night, and the financial
statements, which were not completed
when the first meetings were held were
presented, and were found to be most
encouraging.**St. Paul's Cathedral.**There was a large attendance at St.
Paul's vestry meeting, held in Croydon
Hall, and the reports received indicate
steady progress. The total receipts
during the year just past amounted
to \$12,305.84, while the total expendi-
tures were \$12,165.94, leaving a bal-
ance on hand in the bank of \$338.74. It
was reported that during the year the
mortgage on the church was reduced
by \$1,000.The money received from the Sun-
day school totalled \$573.22, with total
disbursements of \$470.83, leaving a
balance on hand of \$102.39.The report of the board of missions
presented by S. W. Raymond showed
that since last Easter \$577.06 had been
handed over to the synod treasurer. Of
this amount \$43 was given towards
Jewish missions, \$30 to Huron Col-
lege, leaving only \$514.96 which will
be used for other missions amounting
to \$502.20.The report of the Church Workers'
Association presented by Miss Col-
erick, showed that after meeting all
expenses, amounting to \$109.92,
there still remains a balance in the
treasury of \$56.31.The allotment to the parish for the
M. S. C. was \$903.60, and it was
reported that it had been fully paid.
Memorial Church.The financial report presented at
the vestry meeting in the Memorial
Church by the treasurer, Dr. A. E.
Santo, showed that the church re-
ceipts totalled \$5,553.94, and the dis-
bursements \$5,570.20, leaving a bal-
ance on hand of \$83.64. The mis-
sionary and other offerings added to
the church receipts make a total of
\$8,028.63.Major Hume Croydon, who at the last
meeting was elected representative to
the synod, resigned, and Mr. A. F.
Nash was appointed in his place.**Christ Church.**The church wardens' report present-
ed at the adjourned vestry meeting in
Christ Church showed total receipts of
\$3,881.04, with an expenditure of \$3,-
726.04, leaving a balance in the bank
of \$154.99. The report showed the fol-
lowing receipts and balances: Church
organ fund, \$682.32, balance \$18.07;
mission fund, \$447.35, balance \$34.53;
Sunday school \$213.78, balance \$75.38;
special account \$227.24, balance \$59.76;
Sunday school library balance \$10.88;
Women's Guild balance from last year
\$370.91, making this year's receipts
\$567.29, balance \$58.79; Woman's Aux-
iliary \$19.28, balance \$2.38; King's
Daughters \$78.61, balance \$15.79.There was an informal discussion on
the advisability of having a surplus
choir, and a number of those who
spoke favored the idea strongly. Be-
fore the meeting concluded hearty
votes of thanks were passed to the
various church organizations for the
efficient work they have done, and also
to the rector, Rev. R. S. W. Howard,
and his wife.St. John the Evangelist.
At the vestry meeting in the Church
of St. John the Evangelist, the pastor,
Rev. W. T. Phipps, presided forwardand on behalf of the congregation Mr.
O. Ellwood presented him with a hand-
some check, and spoke of the appre-
ciation the members of the church
feel of his services. Rev. Mr. Phipps
replied suitably. The financial state-
ment was presented at the former
meeting, and the auditors, Ross Clark
and Claude Browne, complimented the
wardens on its accuracy and the fine
showing made.**St. George's Church.**A splendid showing was made at
the vestry meeting in St. George's
Church, and reports indicated that dur-
ing the year \$1,150 had been paid on
the church debt, leaving the total
amount now due at \$3,850. The total
value of the church is \$18,349.23. Re-
ports presented showed that the re-
ceipts during the year were: Church
wardens' account, \$3,797.74; King's
Daughters, \$104.36; Sunday school,
\$265.21; church of the stock, and
man's Auxiliary, \$128.69; Mission Band
\$47.15. It was reported that the duplex
sanctuary system is working most
satisfactorily.
