INDUCED TO SURRENDER BY WOMAN'S THREAT

Australian Government Clerk Confesses to Theft of a Huge Sum.

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 7.—Robert Holt, arrested here on his own confession that he stole \$75,000 from the Australian Government as a clerk with the Royal Australian Artillery at Sydney, N. S. W., was induced to surrender by a woman whom he had known in Sydney, and who threatened to turn informer. Holt said the thefts were committed late last February, soon after he became attached to Battery No. 1 of the Royal Artillery. The first theft, \$25,000, was not traced to Holt, and it was only a few days later that he found an opportunity to steal a draft for \$50,000 to which, he said, he forged the name of a quartermaster. He sailed for San Francisco early in March.

NO TAPE MEASURE CAN FIT HEAVEN

Cannot Think of It by Exact Dimensions, Says Rev. Richard Whiting.

THE DEFINITE FACTS

A Meagre Outline Given Upon Which to Base Its Conclusions.

"Is heaven a real place or a condition existing for the happiness of the soul?" The above is the question which ran through Rev. Richard Whiting's sermon in First Methodist Church on Sunday evening, the topic being, "Heaven and Its People."

"There is no compiled records in the books of the Old Testament which refers definitely to the existence of a heaven," said Mr. Whiting. "And the only reference that the Savior Himself made is found in the Book of Matthew xlii, 30, which has a reference to the angels in the celestial world. Christ does not state what occupation the people have in heaven. We have been given a very meagre outline to base our conclusions on."

"Has No Known Dimensions." "Heaven, as I understand it," continued the minister, "is an imaginative picture, a painter's paradise, a poet's dream, is nothing more uncertain than a real heaven. No dimensions of length, width and height, can be given, and the man who would measure heaven in yards, feet and inches by means of a tape line, has a very elementary conception of the future world. The man is a foolish one, who would take such means to determine heaven."

SPECIAL SERVICES IN THREE CHURCHES

Centennial Church Marks Abundant Harvest With Display of Fruit and Vegetables.

Rally day and harvest home services, which were combined in Centennial Methodist Church passed off successfully on Sunday. The church was decorated with emblems of the field, forest and garden, signifying a bountiful harvest.

In the morning service, the pastor, Rev. H. A. Graham, addressed the children on the subject, "Children." He took for his text, "Behold, I Build a House For the Name of the Lord My God." "This was Solomon's message to Hiram, King of Tyre, when about to build a temple at Jerusalem," the minister then told them, that each one of them might say that they were also dedicating a house to the Lord, and that they should be careful of the material they put in the house. The materials used should be truth, courage, purity, goodness and love.

Four hundred children attended the Sunday school services in the afternoon, which is now the high-water mark of attendance. The offering from the school amounted to \$73.50, and this is placed in the fund for the erection of a new Sunday school next spring.

The fruit and vegetables which were used to decorate the church have been donated to the Children's Aid shelter.

Special Services at Adelaide Street. Three services were held in Adelaide Street Baptist Church on Sunday. At the regular morning service, Rev. P. J. Dayfoot told a story of the Provincial Pulpit, Sunday Schools, occupied the pulpit, and preached to a large congregation. Sunday school rally day was observed in the church in the afternoon, the scholars and their parents coming out in large numbers. Addresses were made to the children by Rev. Mr. Dayfoot and Rev. J. H. Boyd, pastor of the church. A special offering for the Grande Ligne was taken up, and a large sum realized. Special music was furnished by the choir.

In the evening, Rev. J. H. Boyd occupied the pulpit, the subject of his sermon being "The Power of Conviction." He based his address on the election of the 2,000 ministers who left the church in 1662. The 250th anniversary of this election was celebrated in Great Britain last Friday.

This week, every evening, with the exception of Saturday, special meetings will be held in the church for the deepening of spiritual life. The annual old people's services were held Sunday morning at the Talbot Street Baptist Church. Automobiles and carriages conveying many old people to the morning service, when the pastor, Rev. H. B. Bingham, spoke on the "Sovereignty of Service." In the afternoon banners were awarded to the three Sunday school classes, which had a perfect attendance for rally Sunday.

PLASTERERS' DEMAND. Montreal, Oct. 7.—The Plasterers' Union of the city has sent to the contractors a demand that their wages be increased from 45 cents an hour to 55 cents an hour. An agreement exists whereby it is necessary for either party to give three months' notice before terminating it.

£60,000 COMPENSATION. Montreal, Oct. 7.—The C. P. R. has arrived at an agreement with the owners of the collier Helvetia, which was sunk in the St. Lawrence by the Empress of Britain on July 27, and have paid them the sum of £60,000 as compensation.

ONLY A MIRACLE CAN PREVENT WAR

English Correspondents Say That the Outlook Is of Darkest.

BOTH SIDES ARE EAGER

War Enthusiasm at Bulgarian and Turkish Capitals Proving Irresistible.

London, Oct. 7.—Wm. Maxwell, the Daily Mail's correspondent, has just arrived in Sofia. Describing the war enthusiasm in Bulgaria he telegraphs: "From the Serbian border to Sofia, I passed through a country which might already be at war. On all sides there was evidence of determined preparation."

"Here at Sofia we breathe the very atmosphere of battle. Popular enthusiasm has swept every obstacle from the path. Neither the king nor the government can stand against it. Like an avalanche it has gathered force, and anything which opposes it is sure to get hurt. "Mobilization proceeds with vigor in disregard of personal consequence. Not a peasant in the remotest hamlet needs to be urged. He is only too eager to join the colors. The capital acclaims him as he marches with his company to receive the salute of the king in the palace grounds."

"Martial law has been proclaimed throughout the kingdom, and only a miracle can prevent war. The powers awakened too late, if indeed they have awakened."

Clamoring for War. The Daily Mail's Constantinople correspondent telegraphs: "The street demonstrations become more heated with each hour. Enthusiasts unsheath their swords, crying, 'This sword shall never be replaced until the enemy see reason.'"

"The enthusiasm for war seems to be on the increase. Turkish women are forming committees to carry on ambulance work, and contributions are being received from all classes of people. The buildings of the great military schools at Monastir and Adrianople have been converted into hospitals and the schools themselves have been transferred to Stambul."

"The minister of war has opened a military register, upon which numerous volunteers for military service have already enrolled themselves. A number of young Albanians, resident in Constantinople, have already inscribed their names. Among the volunteers are several imperial princes, who have enlisted as ordinary soldiers."

The correspondent quotes a high official as saying: "We shall go into battle with clear consciences, determined to do nothing which shall cast a shadow upon the traditional valor of our race. Only a miracle can now avert the catastrophe. Our most optimistic hopes are now fading away. All classes, even our women, our children, and our graybeards, are clamoring for war. Indeed, the very air is reverberating around the whole of our empire. Our solidarity as a people is completely sustained and upheld by the patriotism of pan-Islamism."

HEAD-ON COLLISION

Three Trainmen Killed and Several Injured in Maryland Wreck.

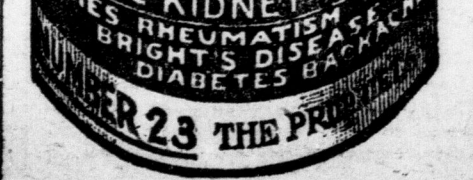

Hagerstown, Md., Oct. 7.—Three trainmen were killed, another was probably fatally injured, and four other trainmen more or less seriously hurt in a head-on collision between a freight train and a passenger train at Hagerstown, Pa., near Shippensburg, today.

The dead: E. S. McClain, conductor of passenger train; J. W. Frederick, fireman; C. R. Gordon, fireman. Of those injured: Frank Krouse, freight conductor, is expected to die from the effects of burns.

The freight train belonged to the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad, which uses the Western Maryland between Hagerstown and Shippensburg.

MINERS GUARDED. Charleston, W. Va., Oct. 7.—Three companies were withdrawn from the martial law zone this morning, leaving 750 men still on duty in the Cabin Creek and Paint Creek country. Miners who have returned to work are still carefully guarded, but by steadily decreasing forces of militiamen.

It was stated here today that Governor Glasscock and his advisers are working on a plan that is expected to result in the withdrawal of all the militia by the end of the week. If the plan is carried out it will eliminate the foreign mine guard system against which the striking miners protested.



TO EXTEND WORK AMONGST JAPS

Methodists of Canada to Expand Missions in the Flowery Kingdom.

DR. ENDICOTT CALLED

A Big Toronto Church Wants the Noted Missionary for Its Pastor.

Brantford, Ont., Oct. 7.—The work of Canadian Methodism in Japan was given a large place in the business of the board of the church at this morning's session. The union of Methodistism in Japan, in the formation of a Japanese Methodist church, seems to have increased the responsibility of mission boards in English-speaking countries, and the Canadian church is planning for such enlarged and aggressive work in that country as it may be able to encompass. There are now nineteen Canadian Methodist missionaries in Japan under the board.

The difficult question of the education of missionary children was discussed. The board decided to establish a special school for missionaries' children in Japan and will endeavor to cooperate with the board of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States, in so doing. The local sub-committee of the board is given authority to provide teachers and matron for the institution.

A proposal was made some time ago that Prof. McLaughlin, of Victoria College, Toronto, should visit Japan especially in the interests of missionary educational work. It was stated before the board that it would be impossible for Prof. McLaughlin to carry out the suggested program owing to pressure of work in the college. The suggestion that Chancellor Burwash be persuaded to take his place, met with hearty approval in the board, and it is possible that he will make a visit to Japan in the interests of the missionary work of the church early in the new year.

Can't Have Endicott. One of the interesting questions coming before the board has been discussed. The official board of Sherbourne Street Methodist church some weeks ago issued a unanimous invitation to the Rev. Dr. Endicott, to become pastor of that church in June next. Dr. Endicott is one of the leaders in Methodist mission work in China, and during his stay in Canada has proved himself a preacher of unusual ability and attraction. The board felt itself unable, however, to yield him up for ordinary pastoral work in Canada.

It was decided that he be asked to accept a position as travelling secretary in Canada for a time. Should he be asked to accept this position his duty churches and awakening renewed interest in the foreign missionary operations of the church. Dr. Endicott is a platform man in Canada today.

TWO MORE AVIATORS PLUNGE TO THEIR DEATH

Aviation Meet at Johannisthal Concluded With a Double Tragedy.

Berlin, Oct. 7.—Aviation week at Johannisthal was concluded Sunday after two more deaths had been added to the long list of fatalities that have occurred among European aviators during the past two months.

A monoplane, driven by Ernest Ailig, and carrying a mechanic, suddenly fell from a height of 600 feet when a wing collapsed. The mechanic was thrown from the machine at a height of 450 feet and his body landed on the ground clear of the wreckage. Ailig fell with the monoplane and was killed instantly.

The accident was witnessed by a big assemblage. Ailig qualified as an aviator last May.

A New Record. Annapolis, Md., Oct. 7.—A new American record for an endurance flight was made here yesterday by Lieutenant John H. Towers, of the navy aviation corps in a Curtiss hydro-aeroplane. He flew continuously in the air for six hours ten minutes and 45 seconds. The best previous American record, made by Paul Piek, was four hours, 23 minutes and 38 seconds.

1,000 NAMES ON LOCAL OPTION LIST

Petition Is Presented To Be Put in Bylaw Form by Township Council.

MANY PERSONS MISSED

Temperance People Sanguine for Sweeping Victory at Polls in January.

The petition, asking that a vote on local option be submitted to the electors of London Township in January, was submitted to the township council at the meeting at St. John's. It was signed with more than 1,000 names, hundreds more than were required by law.

It was submitted to the council by Rev. Ben H. Spence, secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, Toronto; Francis Whitehall, Broughdale, secretary of the committee for London Township, and Rev. W. L. Steeves, pastor of the Egerton Street Baptist Church.

They explained the petition, and informed the council that the names on the petition were bona fide electors. They urged the council to prepare the bylaw and submit it at once.

According to precedence, the bylaw was laid over until the next meeting, and will then be prepared. The bylaw will undoubtedly be submitted.

"We have more than a thousand names attached to the petition," Mr. Frank Whitehall informed The Advertiser. "Two of the chairmen of the divisions did not get their lists of names down in time, or we would have had at least 200 more attached to the petition."

"The township has been divided into 17 subdivisions. Each of the divisions is in the hands of competent persons, who have organized them thoroughly. I can say that the organization is infinitely better than it was three years ago. We will win hands down in spite of the three-fifths clause or I am very much mistaken. The temperance cause is the cause of our lives, make no mistake."

Mr. McDermid Here. Mr. D. A. McDermid, of the Dominion Alliance, Toronto, has been spending some time in the township, looking after the organization, and has about completed his work.

Series of meetings will be held during the campaign.

SPAIN CELEBRATES

Cádiz, Spain, Oct. 7.—Extensive celebrations were held yesterday in honor of the centenary of the Spanish Cortes. The only discord was furnished by a Porto Rican delegate, who, in the course of his speech, declared that the independent party of Porto Rico was working incessantly to free that country from "Yankee domination." He urged the South American republics to come to the aid of Porto Rico.

Ex-Premier Moré characterized the utterance of the delegates as "the only sad note" of the fete.

SMELTERS MAY STRIKE

Salt Lake City, Utah, Oct. 7.—A meeting of the mill and smelter men of Carfield, Utah, was held here last night, at which a resolution was adopted favoring a strike should the Utah Copper Company attempt to operate its mines at Bingham, Utah, with non-union men.

The situation at Bingham is unchanged. Hundreds of miners are leaving the camp daily, and several business houses will be compelled to close unless the strike is settled within a few days.

LAWRENCE STRIKE OVER

Lawrence, Mass., Oct. 7.—About 500 of the 30,000 textile operatives in this city went to work today. Those who were not permitted to enter the mills were said to have been discharged for alleged intimidation of operatives during the Ettore-Giovannitti protest strikes. No disorder occurred.
