LOSS OF ST. THOMAS CONNECTION HEAVY EXPENDITURE TO HIS ROAD

Construction of Bridge To Cost \$100,000 Would Be Necessary if the Railway Was Shut Out From the City's Line.

THE FACTS IN A NUTSHELL.

- 1. The Pere Marquette sealed tender was submitted on the assumption of the Pere Marquette that the people of London were already committed to the municipal operation of the Port Stanley railroad.
- 2. The Pere Marquette would insist on a minimum length of lease of running rights before assuming responsibility for the rebuilding or maintenance of the road in whole or part.
- 3. The Pere Marquette would not agree to contribute towards the re-building of the road to be done by the city or some other party, if the cost exceeded what the Pere Marquette itself could rebuild the road for.
- 4. The offer was made on behalf of the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway, at present leased by the Pere Marquette Railway, which latter corpora tion is now in the hands of a receiver in the United States court.
- ferry connection would enable the Pere Marquette to compete with a municipally operated railway in Ohio, Pennsylvania and lake trade.
- 6. The Pere Marquette operates east of St. Thomas over the M. C. R. lines, and has at present no means of interswitching unto the M. C. Is eastern lines except over the Port Stanley Railway tracks in St. Thomas.
- 7. Without running rights over the Port Stanley Railroad the Pere Marquette could not continue its Buffalo and eastern traffic without bridging the St. Thomas ravine and purchasing a new right-of-way, at a probable cost of
- 8. If the Port Stanley Railroad were electrified, the Pere Marquette would not operate over it, unless the electrical equipment permitted the operation of steam trains, with complete safety to steam traffic and the lives of Pere Marquette trainmen and construction crews.
 - 9. The city would be required to maintain the right-of-way.
- 10. The Pere Marquette, on the authority of General Manager Alfred, would prefer to lease the road and operate it as a steam road, as at present.

C. R., to the effect that the latter railway should also have running rights over the city' Wife Also Asks \$300for Serrailway, because the present lease of the Michigan Central for running rights from the Pere Marquette does not expire until the end of 1913, necessarily linking the two railways together till the end of the present year.

Operate By Steam. All Pere Marquette and Michigan Central trains will under any arrangements which may be effected be operated by steam. Mr. Alfred did not make any pretense of authoritatively representing the M. C. R., but intimated merely that an understanding existed between his railroad and the M.

In view of the fact that the offer made by the Pere Marquette was only a tentative one, made on a mistaken assumption, and hence the offer would be subject to considerable modification, the Pere Marquette Company asked that the exact terms of their offer

should not be made public. Mr. Alfred, personally, was pleas to discover that contrary to the im pression he had gathered, the city of London had not yet definitely decided upon the municipal operation of an electric road between London and Port

Short Lease Not Wanted.

The length of the lease for which the offer was made was not fixed, but Mr. Alfred pointed out that it would not pay his company or any other company to assume the cost, or a portion of the cost of rebuilding and maintaining the road, for a lease for running rights of a comparatively short duration. In this respect, a 30-year lease for running rights would probably be satisfactory to his company. The annual cash rental offered in the tender would be supplemented by the percentage of the cost of rebuilding the many thousands of dollars expended road, which the Pere Marquette was willing to undertake.
