BRITISH HOUSE RETAINS TAXES ON LUXURIES

Efforts of Free Traders To Get Them Removed Failed.

LONDON, May 2.—The House of Commons this evening adopted all the budget resolutions. In the course of the debate free traders tried hard to get the Government to remove the war duties of seven pence on tea and the one-third ad valorem duty on motor cars, clocks, watches and musical instruments. The ground taken by the free traders was that the duties were imposed in order to effect economy in tonnage and discourage spending money for luxuries, and that this no longer was necessary.

The Government resisted all the appeals, contending there was urgent need for revenue, and that it still was advisable to prevent expenditures for luxuries. All amendments proposing the removal of these duties were rejected.

BUILDING ACTIVITY TAKES A DECIDED SLUMP AT KITCHENER

Milk Producers and Dealers Lower Their Prices Several Cents.

KITCHENER, May 2.—The bottom dropped out of building during April here. The total permits amounted to only \$98,415, as compared to \$100,770 for the same period last year. There were only 15 residence permits this year, to 30 last.

A drop in the price of milk was announced here today by both producers and vendors. The former dropped from 28 to 31 cents a gallon, and the latter 10 cents on eight quarts—\$1.10 for eight quarts, instead of \$1.20, being the new price.

SARNIA'S BIRTH RATE TREBLE THAT OF DEATHS

Tax Collections During April Totalled \$4,114.42—Water Rates \$19,184.54.

SARNIA, May 2.—The total amount of taxes and interest collected in this city during the month of April was \$4,114.42, according to the records of City Tax Collector W. Nickels. This amount was divided as follows: 1920 taxes \$2,434.55, interest \$21.45; 1919 taxes \$25.84, interest \$3.61; 1917 taxes \$40.93, interest \$12.83.

The water rates and tapping charges turned into the city exchequer as follows: 1921 water rates \$15,456.11, tapping charges \$311; 1920 water rates \$259.93, tapping charges \$23.50; 1918 water rates \$5; three months' water rates, \$2.

The Grim Reaper was greatly outdistanced by the stork in this city for the month of April, according to the official vital statistics report for that month, released today, which lists 26 births and 8 deaths. Cupid was not very active during the "month of showers," as evidenced by the fact that only 8 marriages were recorded.

Measles, with a total of 10 cases reported, again topped the contagious disease list in this city for the week ending April 30, according to the official health report, issued today, which also records two cases of diphtheria and one of chickenpox. Five deaths were listed.

OTTAWA, May 2.—At the conclusion of the argument in the viaduct case before the railway board today Corporation Counsel Geary on behalf of the city of Toronto, strenuously opposed any further delays. He claimed it was due to the city that the work should be begun and carried through to completion, that the present was an opportune time to carry out the agreement, which was that the work should go on in its entirety. "That is the position the city took a month ago and it still takes the same."

Chairman Carvell asked if Mr. Geary would not consent to any extended time at all. "No," he replied. "The heart is sick with hope deferred. We have waited and acted very decently and with due respect I think the railways have acted very badly in the matter. Of course there should be reasonable time for arranging preliminaries."

RED CROSS CAMPAIGN INAUGURATED BY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL

Effort To Increase Membership Will Be Continued During May and June.

TORONTO, May 2.—His excellency the governor-general signed at Ottawa today a proclamation inaugurating the two months' campaign during May and June which will be conducted throughout the Dominion by the Canadian Red Cross.

This campaign is for membership, and is part of the national crusade for good health, the underlying idea being the education of the greatest possible number of persons to the trying need for preventive measures against the deadly trail of waste and disease left by war.

After reciting that it is of the greatest importance to the well-being of our people throughout the Dominion that the purpose of the Red Cross in carrying on its peace-time program for the improvement of health, the prevention of disease, and the mitigation of suffering, should be realized to the greatest extent, the proclamation commends "the membership enrollment campaign of the Red Cross Society to the sympathetic attention and support of all our loving subjects throughout Canada."

Dr. Robertson, chairman of the Canadian Red Cross, said that the society in its present campaign hopes to increase its membership to six or seven hundred thousand, all of whom will be educated along the line of child welfare and better health in the community.

"We are looking into the future," he said. "Suppose that through this educational work in ten years' time we can put Canada on the same plane of child welfare as New Zealand is on today, we shall then be saving the lives of 12,000 babies a year. Is not this something worth working for?"

CHATHAM BAKERS LOWER BREAD PRICES

Further Reduction in Fall Is Prophesied If Flour Drops.

CHATHAM, May 2.—Local bakers announced a drop in the price of bread today. The retail price is now twelve cents, and if the price of flour drops further, a time a further reduction is prophesied.

The non-jury sittings of the supreme court was opened here today by Justice Sutherland. Only three cases were presented for trial.

HYDRO LINEMAN DIES OF INJURIES

Terribly Burned and Thrown To Ground by Contact With Live Wire.

TILLSONBURG, May 2.—Elgin A. Shieren, aged 21 years, of Ingersoll, died in the emergency hospital shortly after 1 o'clock this morning, and the body was removed to the undertaking parlors of Kellam & Ostrander. On Thursday afternoon Mr. Shieren, who was a lineman employed by the hydro-electric power commission, was repairing some connections on a high voltage wire west of the town and came in contact with the wire. He was thrown 45 feet to the ground, his clothes being set on fire and his body terribly burned. Interment will take place in Ingersoll on Wednesday afternoon.

No Clue Discovered.

The mysterious disappearance of James Sands of Culloden still remains unsolved, and despite the vigorous efforts of numerous search parties, which have been dragging the river and investigating every bit of woods in the vicinity, absolutely no trace of him has been discovered, and foul play is now feared. David Sands, a brother, with whom James had been living, stated this evening that the search parties
