The ground taken by the free traders was that the duties were imposed in order to effect economy in tonnage and discourage spending money for luxuries, and that this no longer



HYDRO LINEMAN DIES OF INJURIES

Terribly Burned and Thrown To Ground by Contact With Live Wire.

TILLSONBURG, May 2.-Elgin A Shieren, aged 21 years, of Ingersoll, died in the emergency hospital shortly after 1 o'clock this morning, and the body was removed to the undertaking parlors of Kellam & Ostrander.
