Aldermen Ashplant, Childs and Judd were named on the committee. Ald. Ashplant expressed surprise that nothing was being done about the auditor's report on the City Gas Company's affairs. He had made some deductions from the report and on question of privilege outlined them. This dealt with a number of interesting remarks in regards to costs and production, and changed from year to year in different items. He also dealt with the financial position of the company, calling attention to one point which, he said, was a "tale-bearer." This was to the effect that though the company was supposed to be losing money, it nev-ertheless paid \$2,800 income tax to the federal government. He touched on the latitude allowed in these reports and concluded that the company must have had a pretty decent ncome to pay that amount. He told the aldermen that the city should take position as accepting only 90 cent gas and tell the private bills committee of the legislature not to touch that rate until the council, had so agreed.

ADD APPROVES PLAN The effort of Ald. Ashplant to have the salary of Deputy Police Magistrate P. H. Bartlett cut off until it is approved by the estimates failed. Again he did not get a seconder to




