

## WAIT FIELDING RIFF POLICY

Members of Commons Eager-  
Anticipate Budget An-  
nouncement Tuesday.

Will Largely Be De-  
ferred Until After Mid-  
week Holiday.

AWA, May 21.—(By Canadian Press.)—The members of the House of Commons are eagerly awaiting Mr. S. Fielding's budget statement Tuesday, and speculation is rife as to the tariff proposals. Mr. Fielding, however, is keeping budget strictly to himself, and the announcement in the House on Tuesday afternoon. The minister of finance is nothing it is generally considered that the budget will contain a lowering of the customs tariff on farm necessities, with a slight increase on other lines to equalize the loss of revenue on the budget will not be announced in earnest until Friday or Saturday. At the conclusion of the budget speech, members will request an adjournment of the House over the holidays in order to give them time to study Mr. Fielding's proposals. It is not thought likely that the budget will object to this proposal. The length of the budget speech is wholly uncertain, although opinion is expressed by prominent members of all three parties with the exception of leading government and opposition members. Speeches will be strictly advisory in character. The House will adjourn at 11 o'clock. It is expected that the House will be in session for a week and a half, instead of the customary two or three weeks. Aggressive members were optimistic tonight that the resolution passed by the House committee on agriculture recommending legislation for the Wheat Board, provided two provinces confer compulsory powers on it, would be brought up and debated tomorrow. Aggressive members want the wheat board to be settled at the earliest possible moment in order to give sufficient time to prepare the machinery for the 1922 crops. They are successful in getting their resolution through the agriculture committee by a majority of four.

## TRONTO OFFICERS SIZE GIANT STILL

TRONTO, May 21.—Provincial inspectors Sarvis, Elliott and Partin raided a Toronto house Saturday and seized one of the largest hog stills yet discovered in the city. Besides the mash, the officers found several 100-pound bags of sugar, hundreds of new bottles, labels, sealings and the like.

## Seeks Sunken Gold on Lusitania in Atlantic Eight Miles Off Irish Coast!

PHILADELPHIA, May 21.—Between June and September Benjamin Franklin Leavitt, who salvaged the steamer *Powhatan* in Lake Huron in 1917 at a depth of 176 feet, expects to dig \$11,000,000 out of the bed of the Atlantic Ocean.

The great treasure hunt—salvaging of the gold sunk with the *Lusitania* and *Arabic*—begins when the steamship *Blakeley* sails from here May 25 for the spot, eight miles off Kinsale Point, Ireland, where the *Lusitania* went down in 1915. The expedition is costing \$250,000 and some 600 stockholders are backing Leavitt.

Divers will have to go down 285 feet to reach the *Lusitania*, and 315 for the *Arabic*—twice as far, Leavitt says, as any diver has ever been able to go in an ordinary rubber diving suit.

But Leavitt has spent six years inventing his own diving armor. In his first test in 1916 he made the world's record descent of 261 feet in Lake Michigan.

Eight diving suits have been built in Leavitt's own factory here at a cost of \$2,500 each. The Leavitt suit is made of manganese bronze, a quarter inch thick, the torso and headpiece solid and the arms and legs made of ribbons of bronze encased in rubber, with ball bearings at the shoulders.

**Hopes to Find Millions.**  
"Millions in treasure at the bottom of the ocean never has been salvaged beyond a depth of 150 feet," says Leavitt, "because the pressure is too great. Air lines get tangled and no diver can work at that depth more than 20 minutes, with an hour and a quarter to lower and pull up."

Leavitt says a novice can go down in his suit from 300 to 500 feet and remain four hours.

Air is manufactured within the suit from a tube containing 8 cubic feet of oxygen and nitrogen drawn from a four-pound cylinder of caustic soda. A valve outlet discharges the air, keeping pure air circulating at least four hours.

The only line that connects the diver with the ship above will be a half-inch non-twisting cable that costs \$1,120. Inside this will be a telephone wire connecting with a transmitter and receivers within the headpiece.

The diving suit weighs 350 pounds—but the enormous pressure of deep water reduces the weight on the diver to 75 pounds.

Another Leavitt invention is a deep-sea light, a glass globe half an inch thick containing a 300-candlepower bulb. A series of these will be dropped on weights enabling the diver to see over a radius of seven feet.

The salvage ship will be held directly over the sunken ship by six 5-ton anchors. Aboard will be two tons of dynamite. By electrical detonation dynamite will be set off under water to blow open the strong rooms of the *Lusitania* and *Arabic*. Each ship has \$5,000,000 in gold bars in her strong room, according to insurance records. Leavitt plans to lift the gold to the surface with a 20-ton boom.

He plans to lift intact the *Lusitania* purser's safe which is estimated to contain \$1,000,000 in money and jewelry. Very little is believed to be in the purser's safe of the *Arabic*, which lies 49 miles from the *Lusitania* wreck.

"I do not attempt to consider the validity of these contentions, as in my view there is a serious and far-reaching question to be determined, and once satisfied that this is the case my duty upon an injunction motion is to devise some way by which the subject matter of the suit may be kept safely pending the final determination of the action."

**Consequence Serious.**  
"Under the statute, if the money is not collected and paid over each day the provincial treasurer may call on the provincial police to close the track and prevent the continuation of the racing. If the tax is not lawfully imposed the consequence is most serious. On the other hand, all the province can desire is the payment of the tax if validly imposed."

"There is a serious question whether this action is rightly constituted. I do not determine this, but leave it to be dealt with in due course. At present it seems to me that once it is established that a tax is illegal and beyond the power of the province the court must have the power to prevent it being enforced. The alternative that the tax must be deposited with the court and then the person wronged must ask the attorney-general for a fiat to present a petition of right which may or may not be granted at his discretion, is tantamount to a denial of justice."

**Pay Tax Into Court.**  
"The plaintiff, it is said, and it is not denied, is of ample substance. The situation will, I think, be adequately met by providing that upon the plaintiff undertaking to pay into court from time to time as soon as amount payable in respect of the tax claimed can be ascertained and making payments in accordance with this undertaking, the defendants be enjoined from taking any proceedings under the statute in question based upon any default or supposed default of the plaintiff under the statute."

"If the plaintiff does not comply with this undertaking, liberty is reserved to move to dissolve this injunction on 12 hours' notice."

"The money will be subject to the order of the court, so full justice can be done when the case is heard. The plaintiffs must also as a term of this order facilitate any appeal."

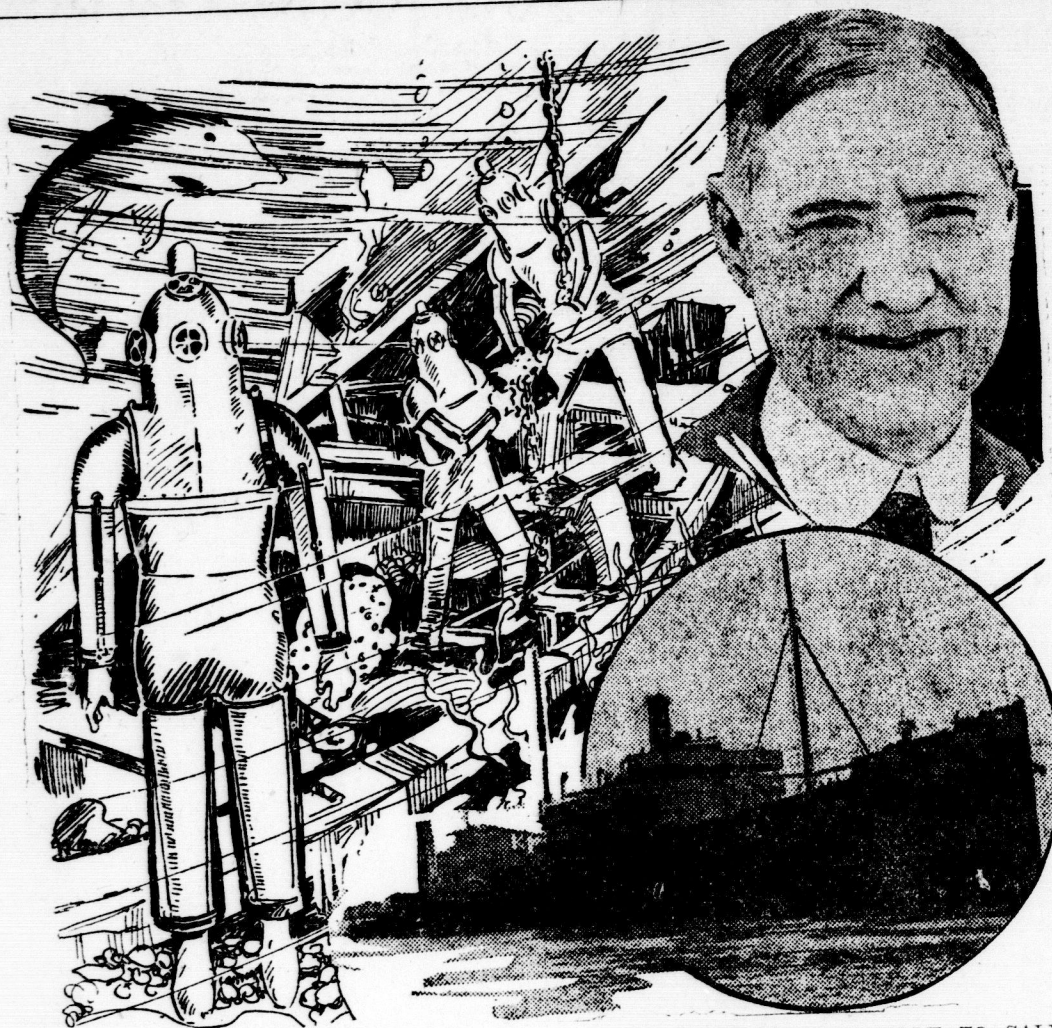
Canadian National Railways Announce Reductions.

Travel to British Columbia should take a step forward with the marked reductions in passenger fares just announced by the Canadian National Railways. The return rate from Toronto and Hamilton will be \$109.55 to Vancouver, Victoria, Seattle or Portland, Ore. A circuit tour to include two days on the company's splendid British Columbia steamships between Prince Rupert and Vancouver, may be taken at an extra cost of \$13 to cover meals and berth on steamer. To Calgary, Edmonton and Jasper Park and return fare is \$87.80.

All tickets carry the usual optional route privileges, enabling passengers to travel via the Sudbury-Port Arthur route in one direction, and via the Transcontinental Line back of the height of land, via Cochrane and Cobalt in the reverse. Wide choices are also available on Canadian National route west of Winnipeg.
