Associated Press Despatch. Shanghai, Sept. 17 .- Renewed evidences of the spread in China of civil war to the Manchurian-Chilian front were contained in previous reports received here yesterday telling of a battle at Chaoyang, where the forces of General Chang Tso-Lin. Manchurian war lord, were said to have clashed with those of Wu-Tei military head of the Peking government, as the contestants in the Manchurian hostilities are taking sides in the fighting between rival military gov-

ernors for possession of Shanghai.

Military observers expected the opening of the hostilities would have a direct effect on the battling near here. For the past 36 hours rival Tiangsu and Chekiang armies have here.
