

THRONGS ATTEND ST. PAUL'S BAZAAR

Cronyn Hall Is Scene of Gay Autumn Fete, Followed by Church Supper.

Cronyn hall was on fete yesterday for the annual autumn bazaar. The hall was very attractively banded with red and white crepe paper, and gay little clown dolls reposed on one wall. Mrs. Chadwick is to be given much credit for her arrangement of the decorations, and also for the effective way she used the union jack and Canadian flags, adding a very patriotic touch to the event.

Mrs. Chadwick ushered to the tea-room, where Miss Meredith and Mrs. Jeffrey Hale presided over the tea-cups, and coffee urns. Here, as in the hall, flags and red and white bunting were used. The basement, where the supper tables were arranged in rows, covered with snowy cloths and adorned with vases of red geraniums, was a popular spot. Here the decorations carried out the color scheme of the rooms upstairs. The tables were laid for 250 guests, who were served supper during the progress of the bazaar.

Upstairs in the hall, the booths displaying their wares were very prettily arranged. In the center was the candy booth, with all the home-made candy displayed—boxes of red and white mints, dainty baskets, looking tempting.

To the left of the door was the fancy work booth, where beautifully worked luncheon sets, pillowcases, towels and many more gifts were displayed. Next to it was the flower booth, presided over by the girl guides in uniform, where lavender bags, maple leaves, flowers and seeds were for sale.

Then came the Country store, and no store in Western Ontario could have been more attractive or displayed such tempting articles. Manufacturers had donated samples of every description, and some had even gone so far as to send real-sized parcels.

Next to the store was the confectionery booth, where very delicious cakes, home-made bread, plum puddings, mince-meat, cookies and pies were temptingly placed in view of the eye. Beside it was another booth of aprons and towels and fancy work, and further on came the dolls, who had been becomingly crowned by very patient women, even to silken "dandies".

The baby booth, with its pink and blue daintiness, presented a very
