Low Lands Will Be Reclaimed at Practically No Cost.

Londoners visiting Toronto exhibition did not realize that while they viewed the magnificent, well-kept waterfront at exhibition park they were standing on an old garbage dump that extends back to the vicinity of the manufacturers' building.

The city engineer who surveyed over that piece of ground when it was in a less dignified state has plans

to make the low lying land owned by the city between the L. and P. S. bridge and the Wellington road, on the south side of the river, just such another beauty spot and a public playground, with no cost particularly

A plant to take care of sewage sludge will be erected this winter, the engineer states, and this sludge will be hauled to the 30-acre stretch and will in time be covered with a layer of cinders and ashes from the incinerator. The process will be repeated until the land is high enough to go ahead with a playground propo-

"This will come about in at least five years' time," said the city en-gineer in discussing the matter. "We will get rid of the sludge, cinders, etc., and at the same time adding a beauty spot for the southern part of the city for recreation and park pur-

The engineer also proposes to manufacture activated sludge, which manufacture activated studge, which can be used for fertilizing lawing, golf courses, etc., and is sold in powdered form. The city of Milwaukee operates a plant on a huge scale and sells activated sludge that costs \$12 a ton to produce for \$22 per ton, and has difficulty in supplying the demand.





MUST FACE **CHARGE OF**

Goldstein \$60.50 For Chickens,

States Witness. THREE TESTIFY

Farmer Declares Crate of Fowl Identified As His.

After three witnesses had been heard, Alex. Goldstein and Louis Brinder, both of this city, were committed to stand trial at the next sitting of the supreme court on a charge of receiving stolen goods by Magistrate Hawkshaw. On their previous appearance in court the charge was stealing chickens, but it has been amended to receiving stolen goods. The charge read this morning was

that on Sept. 11 they sold 104 chickens to Silverwoods, Limited, knowing them to be stolen. Gordon Douglas of Silverwoods identified Goldstein as the man to whom he had paid \$60.50 for the chickens. He was not sure that he had seen Brinder around. The amount was paid in cash.

The next witness was George Mc-Intosh of London township. On the evening of Sept. 10 he had 52 chick-ens stolen from his barnyard. On the 11th he was asked by High Constable Wharton to go to Silverwoods and see if he could identify his chickens. He did so, and he saw h chickens in a crate.

Recognized Hen.

Though not a poultry expert. was sure they were his chickens. There was one hen which had its toes on both feet turned in, and it was there. That was how he really recognized his flock, he declared. Questioned by J. M. McEvoy, K.C., counsel for the accused, McIntosh admitted that if chickens from a neighboring flock were mixed with his own he might have difficulty in identifying his own.

"Then the only real claim you can make to identifying them is that one said Mr. McEvoy. Witness reluctantly admitted that
