### TORRID SANDS A WAITING PILGRIMAGE OF SHRINERS, HERE THOUSAND STRONG

From Far Away, East and West, Bands Came Today.

DETROIT AND TORONTO  
Business Sessions Held This Afternoon and Ceremonials Tonight.

Garbed in their picturesque costumes of red, yellow and green, the official shrine colors, the members of the Mocha patrol and Mocha temple band at noon today welcomed the vanguard of Shriners who came to London to attend the Mocha temple ceremonial and business meeting.

From as far east as Toronto and west to Saginaw, Michigan, nobles of the order this morning began the pilgrimage to the headquarters in London.

At 1:25 a fanfare of trumpets greeted Judge Clyde E. Webster, potentate of the Mocha temple, Detroit, and 29 officers. These, with other visiting brethren, arrived in three special coaches on the C. P. R. train from Detroit.

Although Western Ontario was thoroughly represented by visiting members, Windsor sent the largest quota with 150 lodges; more than 100 came from St. Thomas, nearly 150 from Brantford; Stratford temple sent 100 and an equal number brought greetings from Kitchener and Galt.

The afternoon sessions saw the enthusiastic welcoming of the officers and brethren of the visiting lodges, as well as the 50 novices who were initiated into the mysteries of the order at the Masonic Temple on the evening of the burning sands.

Within the temple stitken Union Jacks and the red, green and gold colors of the order were draped about the auditorium. Although the extensions to the edifice have not yet been completed they have been carried far enough to permit the ceremonial to go forward.

The auditorium has been lengthened an additional 25 feet and scenery from the Majestic theatre made a colorful background for the dais seating the Oriental officers.

### BUSES FAIL TO APPEAR IN LONDON

Twenty-Passenger Machine Now Ready For Business Here.

PERMIT HELD UP  
City Sanction Depends On Securing Liability Insurance Policy.

Two buses owned by the Metropolitan Bus Company of Toronto, scheduled for operation on the London South run today have not yet arrived in the city and no word has been received from the president of the company, C. C. Kann, as to when the buses will arrive.

However, there will be a 20-passenger bus in operation tomorrow if A. Cotter, another Toronto bus proprietor, gets back this afternoon with his liability insurance policy which must be turned over to the city treasurer before he can pick up a passenger on London streets.

Mr. Cotter, who has been operating his bus on the highway between Hamilton and Toronto, finds that business is not so good just now and has decided to try his fortunes in London.

He drove his bus to London yesterday and placed it in Terry's garage. Last night Mr. Cotter approached City Treasurer James Dell regarding a permit. He showed a specimen copy of his insurance policy issued in Toronto, but was told that it was not sufficient.

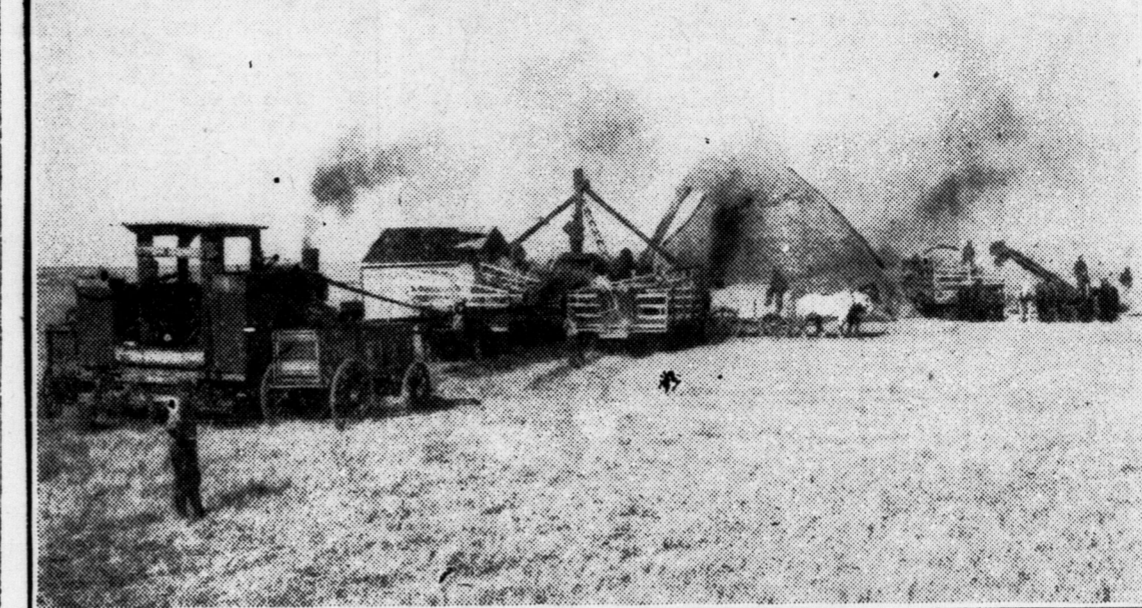
### Adviser To Present Pope Now Visiting In London

Rev. Bernardino M. Russo Will Say Mass Here on Sunday.

Italian Catholics of London have been signally honored by the coming of Rev. Fr. P. Bernardino M. Russo, procurator-general of the Third Order Regular of St. Francis, of Rome, an adviser to His Holiness Pope Pius XV.

On Sunday morning the distinguished cleric will celebrate mass in St. Peter's parish hall for the Italian residents of the city and will also address them in their native tongue.

By virtue of his high office in the Franciscan order, Rev. Fr. Russo is in close contact with the Vatican and where he is often called into consultation with his holiness the pope on matters of state.

MAINTENANCE MEN QUIT TWO COLLIERIES  
Greenough and Natalie Mines in Danger of Being Flooded.

Associated Press Despatch. Shamokin, Pa., Oct. 9.—Maintenance men employed at the Greenough and Natalie collieries near Mount Carmel went on strike yesterday in compliance with an order issued by District President Chris J. Golden.

Later on Brinder told him that he bought them from a man named "Ed" who lived in East London. They had paid him for the chickens, and had then gone to a barn near Lambeth to get them. Though not a poultry expert, he was sure they were his chickens. There was one hen which had its toes on both feet turned in, and it was there. That was how he really recognized his flock, he declared.

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The next witness was George McIntosh of London township. On the evening of Sept. 10 he had 52 chickens stolen from his barnyard. On the 11th he was asked by High Constable Wharton to go to Silverwoods and see if he could identify his chickens. He did so, and he saw his chickens in a crate.

DEFENCE OBJECTS.  
Witness reluctantly admitted that this was the truth.

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High Constable Wharton was the next witness. He told of arresting Goldstein and Brinder at their home the morning after the sale to Silverwoods. They admitted stealing the chickens to Silverwoods, but could not remember from whom they bought them, or how much they had paid.

### MUST FACE CHARGE OF RECEIVING

Alex. Goldstein Received \$60.50 For Chickens, States Witness.

THREE TESTIFY  
Farmer Declares Crate of Fowl Identified As His.

After three witnesses had been heard, Alex. Goldstein and Louis Brinder, both of this city, were committed to stand trial at the next sitting of the supreme court on a charge of receiving stolen goods by Magistrate Hawkshaw. On their previous appearance in court the charge was stealing chickens, but it has been amended to receiving stolen goods.

THE charge read this morning was that on Sept. 11 they sold 104 chickens to Silverwoods, Limited, knowing them to be stolen, Gordon Douglas of Silverwoods identified Goldstein as the man to whom he had paid \$60.50 for the chickens. He was not sure that he had seen Brinder around. The amount was paid in cash.

Do you know who this "Ed" was? Crown Attorney Judd asked Wharton.

"It was Ed. Harlow, who lived on Egerton street," was the answer.

"Do you know what occupation Harlow followed?" queried the crown.

DEFENCE OBJECTS.  
The defence lawyer objected to this answer and sought to know upon what grounds it was made. He had been convicted of stealing at Stratford and St. Mary's, was the reply.

DEFENCE OBJECTS.  
Mr. McEvoy's objection was not sustained, and the answer was entered in the evidence.

DEFENCE OBJECTS.  
As the defence did not wish to place any witnesses on the stand, Magistrate Hawkshaw committed the defendants to trial. Bail was renewed.
