Ouezzan, French Morocco, Oct. 21.—The Foreign Air Squadron, which has been operating from Ouezzan since July 1940, will be disbanded at the end of the month. The squadron was formed in 1938 and has since that time operated from various bases in North Africa. It has been one of the most successful units of the Royal Air Force in the Mediterranean theatre. The squadron's operations have been characterized by its high speed and accuracy. Its aircraft have been seen in action over many of the most important targets in the area.
