PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS

During the current year a number of cement sidewalks will be laid throughout the town. The majority of the members of the Town Council have come to this decision but not without hearing the objections of fellow members and ratepayers residing on a number of the streets.

The sidewalks proposed in some instances are a necessity and should have been constructed long ago. In two there is room for doubt. Any objection that there may be to these, however, should be based on the question as to whether or not they would be of public service. While it might be unfortunate for certain property owners, who would receive no benefit from the proposed improvements, to bear a share of the cost yet, especially where there is a big frontage, yet there is no injustice when the requirements of the public as a whole are considered.

Probably the fact that such employment was to be given to men of the town this year as possible was largely responsible for the decision to construct all of the proposed sidewalks. The important point, however, is that more employment might have been provided on roadway repairs and improvements for the same expenditure of money as is necessary for the construction of sidewalks the necessity of which is doubtful. Of course the cost of repairs would then have had to be borne by the corporation instead of the property owners on the streets.

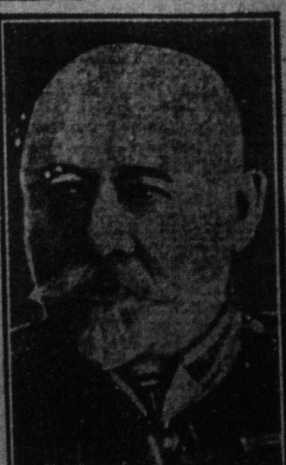
Flood Situation at Edmonton Slightly Improved
