"The jurors for Our Lady the Queen The jurors for Our Lady the Queen present that the Union Colliery Company of British Columbia, Limited Liability, is a company duly incorporated under the 'Companies act, 1878,' for the purpose amongst other things of acquiring coal lands in the province of British Columbia, for extracting ceal therefrom, and of erecting and using tramways and roadways necessary for transporting said coal from the mines to the place of shipment.


