Mr. Spratt was committed for trial. The hearing of, the charge against Mr Houston, of the same company, terminated some days ago, he also having een committed. Both defendants were admitted to bail.

Peters & Wilson, solicitors, testified that Mr. Andrew Bechtel had come to the firm's, office and he (Mr. Wilson) had overheard a conversation between Mr. Peters and Mr. Bechtell wherein the former had stated that Bullock, the chief witness in the case against Mr. Spratt would demand \$750 as compensation for the action which the firm had previously brought against
