Gentus Me murder, will out, and the history of modern literature provides us with some striking examples of men and women who, although humbly born and denied by circumstances any educational advantages, have given to the world some remarkable literary works. Although Mackintosh was a choemaker by trade, he was one of the most notable rersonalities that the North Country as of recent times produced, and his 'History of Civification in Scotland,' in four big volumes, has been described as one of the most complete nistories of Scotland ever written.

When Mr. Flemming rose to speak, he was greeted with loud and continued ap-plause. He said he believed that the valley Railway would be a great fac-tor in the development of the pro-vince. But the government intended to acquire the deserted farms and im-prove them, selling them to settlers at cost. These farms would be in coadition to produce a crop the first year and they will be sold to the settler at an initial cost of 25 per cent. of the whole, with the balance payable in ten equal instalments with 5 per cent. in terest. This would be quite independent of a plan which would be worked out in conjunction with the Canadian Pacific Railway for assisting worthy immigrants into the province. there was another plan to assist im-migrants already here to bring their families out.
