Contractor Charlebois, who was on the spot, the government inspector of build-ings, and other experts present, unite in declaring that dynamite was used and all assert emphatically that there was none on the premises nor being used in any way by those engaged at the work. The damage by the first explosion con-sists of an aperture in the wall of the third flat about fifteen feet in height and directly over the entrance to the assembly chamber. Several cross beams were broken into fragments by the concussion, and the solid walls were so cracked as to render them in-secure.
