

The Firm's Liabilities Placed at \$75,00 of Which Sum \$20,000 is Unsecured A Sharp Dectining in Prices Brin About the Collapse.

Messrs. C. Richardson & Co., the well-know pickle manufacturers and canners, suspend yesterday. The liabilities are placed at \$7 000, but those not secured amount to ou \$20,000. No statement of assets has be made, but the amount is considerably un that of the liabilities.

The immediate cause of the failure is sharp decline in canned goods." At the ti of the extension of time granted last Apr the firm had \$20,000 worth of canned goods stock. It was confidently expected that the would have a 25 per cent. profit on their sa sidering the prospects for a rise in pri This expectation was not realized, but on contrary the decline brought about a 25 cent. loss. The decline has been brou about by large blocks of canned goods be thrown on the market. The Suyder ba rupt stock contributed 10,000 cases tomatoes and the Kirkendow stock of Ha ilton \$28,000 worth, all of which w "slaughtered." The canned goods trade l been poor all the season. In Janua Richardson & Co. were carrying \$33,000 wor and it is safe to say that they have made money out of this season's trade.
