Sheep cannot always he held down, for their wool is one of the necessities of civilization and i can never be kept so low in price that it must be produced at a loss for any great length of time. Sheep can be made profitable aside from the produc tion of wool, if care is taken in thei management and the right breed is kept. Just at present the fine, heavy wooled breeds are under the clouds of low prices, and thousands of farmers who have well-bred flocks are selling them at any price that is offered. This sort of a panic always has the result of reducing the stocks to a point that brings about a violent reaction in prices and those who are wise enough to hold on and keep their stock up and give it good care will profit by it in the end. This has been the history of the sheep industry time and again and fortunes have been founded on wise fore sight in this direction. The wooled breeds are just as good for mut ton as any other, and there is no reason why every breeder of them should sel them and invest the money in other lines of stock or breeds of sheep. Fine wool is a necessity and the time will demand, and the man who has spent time, skill and money to perfect a flock of any of the merino breeds will receive a price for his stock that will make them profitable.


