Tight Play Is Featured In Benefit Football Game

ABOUT \$500 RAISED

Proceeds Will Go To Widow of Late George Bolton

ST. THOMAS, July 2.—An all-star football team picked from the different local teams defeated a London all-star aggregation by a score of 3 to 1 at the Woodworth avenue grounds here this evening before a crowd of some 500 fans in a benefit game for the widow of the late George Bolton, a prominent football supporter and late president of the St. John's Ravens Club, who was killed in an M. C. R. crossing accident here two months ago. While no definite financial statement has yet been made, it is believed that the game will net some \$500 for the worthy cause.

The game brought out some excellent football and was clean and fast throughout. A strong wind favored the locals in the first half, but they were unable to penetrate the defense of Dennis and Ashton, of London. Advantage varied, but neither team was able to score. In the second frame Mason, center for the St. Thomas team, center for the London team, was the star. He was netted one on Tough. J. Jacques, for the locals, evaded the count with a pretty line that baffled the London defense. He put up a strong game in the London nets. Davey missed two hard tries at the London net, but booted a nice pass to Jacques, who sunk in the second local counter. As the game closed the local forward line piled in another while London failed to take advantage of opportunities when in local territory.

WINGHAM, July 2.—Dominion Day dawned bright and warm in Wingham and in the early morning the people began to drive in from the surrounding country towns and villages for the big celebration. A number were present also from Toronto and American points.

At 10 o'clock a procession was formed and proceeded along Joseph Street to the park, headed by the Wingham band, with a number of decorated cars and bicycles following.

Miss Brawley took first prize for the best decorated motor in the parade. Miss Eleanor McLean took first prize for the best decorated bicycle. A baseball game was played in the forenoon between a picked team from Riverdale and the Wingham nine. The score was 10 to 0 in favor of the home team.

In the afternoon a second procession was formed at Victoria street, on Josephine, and headed by the Wingham band and the pipe band, of Lucknow, proceeded to the park. Sports were the feature of the afternoon program, in which Caledonian games were the outstanding item. David McDonald, of Wingham, piper, took first prize as the best dressed Highlander. William Webster, of Dutton, captured the second prize in this event. William McCrimmon, of Lucknow, was third.

The two daughters of David McDonald, of Wingham, carried off a large number of prizes in the Highland fling, sword dance and other numbers. The prize winners in the baby show were Eleanor Angus, Joseph Baskerville, Irene Taylor and Marion Templeton, all of Wingham.

The shock was a violent one and many persons on the stationary train were injured, but no one on the Andania special was hurt. The boat train continued to its destination shortly afterwards.

## LONDONER HURT IN MOTOR CRASH

Gordon Edgecombe Overturned In Ditch Near Strathtroy

CAR DESTROYED BY FIRE

Dragged From Beneath Burning Wreck With Difficulty

STRATHROY, July 2.—Gordon Edgecombe, 572 Colborne street, London, required five stitches to close a wound in his leg and his large motor car was completely destroyed by fire when turned over in a ditch a short distance from Strathtroy while on the way from London to-night.

The accident occurred when Mr. Edgecombe met another car on the road. When the car turned over Mr. Edgecombe was pinned beneath the wreck by a hand and foot, and was pulled to safety with difficulty by a companion, named Groschaw, before the fire which started gained any considerable headway. It was found necessary to remove his shoe in order to drag him from beneath the wreckage.

Mr. Edgecombe had spent the day in Strathtroy with his father-in-law, Wesley Frangley. He received word that his father, R. G. Edgecombe, 578 Colborne street, London, was in difficulty with his car which had broken down about five miles north of Strathtroy. Mr. Gordon Edgecombe was returning from London to Strathtroy after having taken his father home, when the accident occurred.

The injured man was attended by Dr. Berdan and later was taken by motor to his home in London.

To Name Committee To Deal With Merger.

CONVENTION OPENS TO-DAY

Much Interest In Plan For a Re-organization.

VANCOUVER, July 2.—(Canadian Press.)—Many important questions will be dealt with at the annual convention of the Great War Veterans' Association, which opens here to-day. Considerable interest centers in the proposal for the general reorganization which will be discussed. The Dominion executive, which has been sitting three days, preparing reports, resolutions and recommendations and whose work has not yet been completed, announced yesterday that a committee would be appointed to deal with amalgamation with other veterans' organizations; that some action would be taken on a recommendation from Australia suggesting a federation of all English-speaking veterans; and that something will be done to consolidate the success gained in Parliament's adoption of the Ralston report on pension reforms.

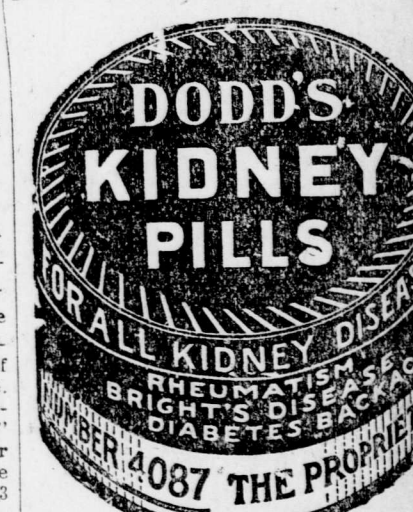
## GUELPH MAN HEADS ONTARIO CARPENTERS

DEATH OF FRENCH AUTHORESS

PARIS, July 2.—Mary King Waddington, authoress and widow of the prominent French statesman and diplomat, William Waddington, is dead. She was 80 years of age. Mme. Waddington wrote some interesting memoirs of her experiences as a diplomat's wife. Her other publications included "Chateau and Country Life in France," 1908, and "My War Diary," 1917. Her husband, who died in 1884, was prime minister of France in 1879. From 1881 to 1892 he filled the post of French ambassador at London.
