ious dispute has taken place between the people of Mexico and the Texans, in consequence of Gen. Gaines encamping at Chihuahua. The former maintain that the troops have occupied a Mexican town, and every facility to desertion for the purpose of aiding the Texans; while the latter assert that Nacodoches does not belong to Mexico. We observe in a paper published by Grigg, of Philadelphia, that the Sabine river divides the American territory from Mexico, and that the people of the east branch is the boundary. Nacodoches is on the western branch, and must of necessity belong to the United States. New Estremadura is a Republic and acquires its independence by the Texan armies. Should this take place, a law has passed Congress which it will be received into the American Union.

This circumstance is regarded as a triumph given by American politicians, and is a victory of the brilliant and powerful delivered a few months ago by the John Q. Adams in Congress. Mr. Adams' rule was to recognize new States, and he had secured their independence and provided for its preservation by an armed Government. The last English papers we have seen of a discussion that took place in the House of Commons on the State of Texas, which Mr. Hay stated that the Slave trade prohibited by the laws of Mexico, and the revolted Province of Texas should be declared to the U. States and then engaged in proscribed traffic, it would violate a treaty made with England. The subject assumes an interest and importance which will doubtless bring it under the consideration of Parliament and of Congress.

After the play he was called for by a House, and made a very neat and touching speech, in which he said he had accepted an engagement in London to endeavour to prove the assertion that the English will support an American Actor with the same liberality that is shown to English Stars in the United States. He took his leave under the most enthusiastic and long continued calls of applause. Mr. Forrest is a very clever man, and independently of the good feeling that exists between the mother and daughter nations; we are confident that his talents will meet that fair consideration and respect which would be shown to a theatrical aspirant of any nation; and that the decisive voice of a London audience will place him in his true position among his competitors.

1st. You are to play and wash your Engine once every month, as long as the season may permit, and if any Fireman neglect his duty in this case, he shall forfeit the sum of 2s. 6d. for every such default.
2nd. If any fireman do not appear at his Engine before it is brought to the place of playing, he shall pay 1s. 6d.
3rd. If any Fireman be not present when the list is called, he shall forfeit for every such default 7 1-2d.
4th. You are to repair to your Engine House at the first notice of fire, either by the ringing of the bell or by cry; to take your Engine and lashing hose to the place of fire, and work the same according to the directions of your Engineer or his assistant, and be sure that the man who takes the pipe or leader does not quit his place, under penalty of 2s. 6d. for each such default.
5th. If any of said Firemen absent themselves before they are discharged by their Engineer or his assistant or by the foreman of the Engine, he shall forfeit for every such offence the sum of 2 1-2d.
6th. If any Fireman have notice of fire, either by the ringing of the bell or by outcry and hearing by the way that such fire is extinguished and comes not to the Engine House to see all things put in their proper places, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of 3s. 3d.
7th. If any Fireman having notice of fire either by the ringing of the bell or by outcry, does not repair immediately to the Engine House, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of 3s. 9d.
